BASEBALL

Hillsboro ball fans will have the opportunity of witnessing two of Portland's top-notch teams battle next Sunday for a City League honors on the Hillsboro diamond when the league-leading Hesse-Martin Iron Works squad tackles the Arleta Woodmen of the World.

This game is a regularly scheduled contest of the Portland Baseball Association specially staged that local folks may have their ball game even though the home team is traveling. That it will be one for blood is the opinion of Secretary Simonsen, of the Association, as the W. O. W. boys, runners-up in the percentage standing, are out to tumble the iron workers from their perch on the pennant ladder.

Derdorf, the long, lanky, freckled-faced twirler of the Hesse-Martin team, is the strike-out king of the league, having retired more batsmen than any one twirler in the circuit. On the other hand the "wow" have a mid-get southpaw in Lefty Leonetti, who is conceded to be the best southpaw in the business, size and weight considered. He was sold to the Woodmen by the Multnomah Guards and was considered by them one of their best bets.

Hesse-Martin was defeated by Woodburn by one score last Sunday and has won three and lost one in the league games. The Woodmen have won two and lost one. Bill Harris, local man, will umpire the game which is scheduled to start promptly at 2:30.

The big Pythian District Convention at Forest Grove, Saturday night, was well attended. Work was exemplified in the Rank of Page to six candidates. The Band of the Dramatic Order of Knights of Khorassan came out from Portland to furnish music for the program. They stopped in Hillsboro while enroute and rendered several numbers. The big convention closed its session at one o'clock in the morning with a cafeteria luncheon. About twenty went up from Hillsboro and ten from North Plains.

Manager Maling Says All Will
be in Readiness

Investment continues big in lumbering circles, and only a car shortage can stop 1920 from being a banner year for Oregon's timber interests. The cut in North Washington County is bringing thousands of dollars weekly to labor and trade.

The Hillsboro Cannery is getting its finishing touches, and Mr. Maling, the manager, will soon have the machinery installed. He will be in condition to operate on cherries as soon as they come in and will also can raspberries and loganberries in season.
