She was the daughter of the late William Mauzey, who settled on a donation land claim at West Union, in pioneer days, and practically spent her girlhood in Washington County.
 She was born in 1849. Her husband was an attorney in Seattle, and settled there when the Queen City was a hamlet. He died 40 years ago. Since her husband's death she lived with her daughter, Mrs. Nelson Margetts, whose husband is Col. Margetts, on Gen. Pershing's staff in the American forces, A. E. F., and now stationed at Coblenz. She was in France when the great war broke.
