Things Looked Fine Early in the Game but Sleep Caused Defeat

Hillsboro started out in fine fettle, and it looked like it was a Waterloo for Sherwood. But Sherwood never gave up the ship. They played ball all the time—knowing that a game is never lost until the last inning is played, and that things may change in a ball game just like weather changes in a thunder-storm country. Their optimism and grit was rewarded in the last innings of the game, and when they pulled out for the dressing room, the score stood 3 for them and 3 for Hillsboro. Cappel took nine chances without an error at the keystone sack. Erwin, the star centerfielder, was pulled in the second inning on account of a broken finger and this left a hole in the center. Edwin Burkhalter played a heady game, making two of the three Hillsboro runs, showing his ability running on bases. Baker, the new catcher, showed up good. Gray pitched brilliant ball, allowing only six scorching hits, three of them being "scratches." Six errors by team mates after leading up to the seventh inning put Sherwood all to the good and after that it was goodnight for the H. A. L.'s.

CONTRACTOR WINS IN CIRCUIT COURT

Feldschau Gets Verdict Against Clatsop County, \$21,614.86

TRIAL LASTED 12 DAYS

Hare and Teiser Win Hard Fought Battle

Fred C. Feldschau, a contractor, was awarded a verdict of \$21,614.86 against Clatsop County in Circuit Court last evening about 8 o'clock, after four hours of deliberation by a jury. The trial lasted 12 days, and was a legal battle from start to finish. Sydney Teiser, of Portland, assisted by Wm. G. Hare, fought the case for Feldschau, and G. C. Fulton and E. C. Judd were counsel for Clatsop County. The case revolved around a contract for clearing, grading and ditching some right of way for a highway in Clatsop County. The county, alleging that Feldschau was not living up to his contract as to the speed limit in preparing the road, took charge of the work after paying Feldschau something like \$7,000. Feldschau claimed a little over \$21,000 was due him and brot suit. Change of venue brot the case to Washington County. Feldschau claimed he could have filled his part of the contract but for the fact he was forced to work at points where the moisture of winter months retarded him, and had he been allowed to work elsewhere on the body of the work he could have lived up to the terms as specified. The county contended that they were the arbiters as to where he should work and claimed contract conformity in taking hold of the work on force account.

Teiser and Hare put up a fine fight to win their case, and are feeling pretty good over the verdict. The County notifies the Court that it will appeal. The jury: Wm. Faull, J. R. Deen, J. H. BIG GRAVEL WORKS

The county commissioners court will soon open a big gravel pit and operate a crusher on Gales Creek. The State has loaned the county their apparatus and gravel will be crushed and screened and four trucks will be operated after July 4, rocking the road between Forest Grove and Gaston.

Work will begin first at Dille, and rock will be laid both north and south. The state will send out trucks if needed as the graveling is to be on the regular state highway.

Gaston was practically marooned last winter but when the Fall rains come this year there will be good footing. The rock will be used later as a base for a hard surface road, unless the commission changes the route as already established.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES

The health laws of the State of Oregon require the reporting of the following contagious diseases, by physicians in charge of cases: Chicken pox, diphtheria, erysipelas, german measles, influenza (flu), measles, mumps, pneumonia, scabies (itch), scarlet fever, small pox, tuberculosis, whooping cough.

It is not incumbent upon any one to call a physician for the sake of diagnosis or treatment of these cases, under the law, but the cases must be reported to the county or municipal health officer in any event. The responsible party, if a physician is not called, is the head of the household, in which, the above diseases exist. He is supposed to have the necessary intelligence to make a diagnosis, if he assumes the responsibility of the care of the diseases enumerated above, in the absence of an attending physician.

Severe penalties are imposed under the law for the violation of the health laws relating to the above diseases. It is with the belief that lack of information is the cause of most violation of the law that this bulletin is issued.

All reports made to the County Health Officer, relative to the above, will be used in the interest of public health.
