

## SALMON PACKERS GO BACK HOME DEFEATED

Astoria Put up Good Game, but  
Was Beaten in 10 Innings

SCORE WAS FIVE TO FOUR

Taggart Pitches Locals Out of  
Dangerous Hole in Ninth

The Hillsboro sailor who was wont to watch the big guns roar from the deck of the U. S. S. Pittsburgh, went on the turret Sunday in the ninth inning when Astoria had two men on bases with no outs, and by some nice calcales pitched Hillsboro out of a hole bigger than the Atlantic ocean, ran the game into the extra inning, struck out three and made two putouts in the 9th and 10th and won the game for Hillsboro with the help of Koppie, on first, and a three-bagger by Duke McCurdy, bringing Koppie in, and ending the game for the H. A. L.'s, score of five to four. It was a game that brought the big crowd to its toes all the time. Nielsen pitched the first eight innings and started on the ninth when the change was made.

A big crowd was in attendance, half of which were suffragettes, and the warm day made it ideal for a real ball game.

When Taggart opened up his battery the crowd went into camp meeting shouting and when McCurdy drove the sphere against the fence, bringing in Koppie, pandemonium broke loose, for it meant that the team from the fighting banks came to Hillsboro for no other purpose than to lift Hillsboro's percentage column.

## GEO. HUTCHISON KILLED BY LOG

Was Crushed to Death at Canyon  
Lumber Co. Camp, Saturday

KNOWN AT NORTH PLAINS

Young Man Signals, the Donkey  
Makes Pull and Log Strikes

George S. Hutchison, well known at North Plains and in the Arcade District, was almost instantly killed last Saturday afternoon at the logging camp for the Canyon Lumber Company, above Mountaineale. Hutchison had just made his "tie" and signalled the donkey man. The log struck another and careened in the air, striking the young man and crushing him so that he never knew what struck him.

Hutchison was working at a position known as "chaser," and was very proficient. The camp was working under the State Industrial Accident ruling, and the State will pay for the death loss. He was single, and was aged about 35 years. He was practically raised up on the Ridge about six miles from North Plains. He was a member of Glencoe Lodge No. 22, and the funeral took place Tuesday under the auspices of the order.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Archie Hutchison, of the Arcade district, and the following brothers and sisters: Henry Hutchison, at home; Mrs. Mima Griffin, North Plains; Daniel Hutchison, of near Yakima, Wash.; James Hutchison, at home.

Deceased was sober and industrious, and had many friends in the northern part of the county. He was working with Walter Ballard, of Hillsboro, the only eye witness to the fatality.

**TAP SUGAR SOFTLY**

Honey, Syrup and Dried Fruits  
May Replace Some Sugar in  
Cooking and Serving

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, June 22.—"Conserve sugar by using honey, syrup, and dried fruits—prunes, raisins, figs, dates, pears, and peaches," say food specialists at the Oregon Agricultural College.

Products cooked with strained honey are said to have a pleasing characteristic honey flavor. One cup of honey may replace one cup of sugar, but the milk or other liquid should be reduced 1-fifth cup for each cup of honey.

Spices give their most agreeable flavor when used with honey in all flour mixtures.

Cooking fruits with the cereals will sweeten the cereal and save sugar. Raisins with cream of wheat, figs with wheatina, or farina, are examples of good combinations.

Corn syrup may be used in stewing or baking fruit, using 1-half cup of syrup to each pound of fruit. Dried fruits are stewed 10 minutes after soaking over night in water.

Cereals may be served sweetened with syrup or with sweet fruits.—O. A. C.
