Sam Grathwell, lecturer at Chautauqua on the second afternoon, has had a life experience qualifying him to speak with authority upon the subject, "Getting by Your Hoodoo." For Grathwell knows what it is to have a hoodoo and overcome it. His hoodoo was that of poverty and environment. Part of his boyhood was spent in a



children's home and he was selling papers on the streets when but a child. Before he was twenty he had been messenger in the slums, factory worker, painter, waiter and man-of-all-work in a barroom, elevator boy, stockman and clerk. A chance word of appreciation inspired him to enter night school, then to college. Today he stands as one of the leading men of the Chautauqua platform the country over.
