Three Celebrated Band Organizations to Play For People

FORTY PIECE LADIES BAND

Mammoth Celebration Well Under Way for Three Days Effort

Chairman Phelps, of the Fourth of July celebration, reports splendid progress in lining up a program and attractions which will make Hillsboro's effort the greatest of the Western Oregon territory for this year of our Lord 1920. He has secured the Scotch Bagpipe Band, the finest organization of its kind in the Pacific Northwest, and the Grand Army Pipe and Drum Corps, noted all over Oregon—its members being Veterans who helped preserve the union in the perilous days of '61-5.

Aeroplane carrying passengers and doing flying stunts every afternoon and evening, July 3, 4 and 5; illuminated night flights—all from the aviation field adjoining the grounds; balloon ascensions with three parachute drops each night on all three days; baseball tournaments each afternoon, the finals to have a purse of \$100; athletic contests and sports under the auspices of the American Legion Post; free attractions—afternoon and evening, one of which is DeKohl, in his great balancing feat on a huge sphere on the death stairs, and scores of other features—will make the celebration of interest every hour of every day. There will be dancing on the grounds, starting Friday evening, July 2, Saturday afternoon and evening, and all day Monday and Tuesday night, on a floor that has been enlarged to 200x85 feet.

The big civic parade on the morning of the Fourth promises to be better than ever, and business men are doing their share to contribute to its success.

On the fifth there will be a rousing oration following the Declaration of Independence reading, and program.

The evening of the 5th will see the finest fireworks ever witnessed in Oregon. Two hundred display bombs, 850 rockets fired 5 and 25 in schools, and 18 set pieces and patriotic numbers. As Mr. Phelps puts it "it will be the pyrotechnic sight of a lifetime."

STATE HATCHERY FOR CLEAR CREEK

Gales Section to Have \$8,000 or More Spent by Oregon

WILL SUPPLY THE COUNTY

Building Will be 40x70, and Residence for Caretaker

Work will soon start on a State Hatchery on Clear Creek, one of the tributaries of Gales Creek, according to a statement by Eli Howell, of that section, who was in the city, Wednesday. Mr. Howell says that the institution will propagate trout for the streams of Washington County and this will eliminate the necessity of shipping in young fry from outside hatcheries.

The main building for propagation will be 40x70, and besides this equipment there will be a house built for the caretaker. The State has about \$8,000 available for the purpose and construction is to begin in the not distant future, so as to have youngsters ready for delivery early next year.

The site will be about a mile and a half up stream from where Clear enters into Gales, and is ideal for the purpose.

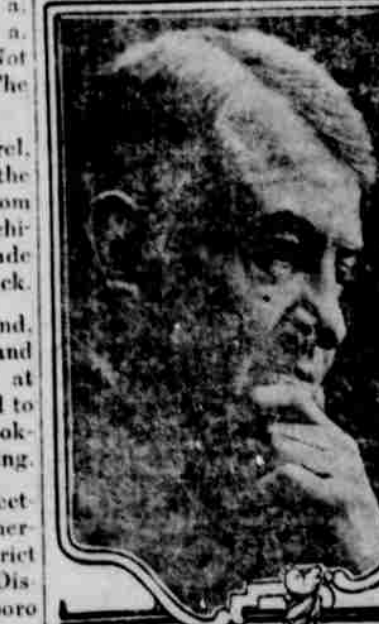
Mr. Howell will oversee the work, and the institution will be up-to-date in every respect.

Washington County has long desired a hatchery for it has many fine streams suitable for trout fishing. The fact, however, that it lays close to Portland, makes it great and close-in fishing ground, and many times the waters are depleted. Fries were located in all of the streams each year for several years past and it has meant better fishing, and the building of the hatchery will mean that the supply can be kept up from time to time. Washington County pays enough to the game commission to merit the investment and sportsmen are glad to see it instituted.
