Hillsboro itself will in a year or so have one field of Logans that will be seventy acres in extent—and

this is said to be the largest individual Logan field in the Northwest. The owners have 100,000 strawberry plants set between the rows for crop next year and this will help the output while the Logans are getting ready to bear.

Hillsboro's building record isn't so slow, anyway, in this year of our Lord, 1920. A little matter of perhaps a couple of hundred thousand is finding its way into structures, commercial and residential, this season. Even a presidential campaign hasn't put a damper on civic progress.

The Parade

Floats are being entered by business houses, church organizations, fraternal societies and private parties—and will be the largest demonstration ever staged in the city.
