

PARTY OF SWISS VISIT THE COUNTY

Spent an Hour in Hillsboro and Then Visit Christie and Helvetia

TOURING UNITED STATES

Think Oregon Wonderful Section of World.

Seven members of a party from Switzerland, touring the United States in the interests of education, promotion of trade, and acquisition of new ideas for use in their own country, arrived in Hillsboro, Oregon, last night. They were piloted to this county by Otto Friedli, of the Oregon Cheese Co., Emil (Friedli), of a photo supply house, Portland; Mr. Aduser, a retired capitalist, of the Rose City; Wm. VanTraschel, a hotel man, and A. Keller, with the Oregon Cheese Company. The party was piloted from here by J. J. Nussbaumer, of near Phillips, and Jos. Mueller, of near Mountaineer, who is a nephew of one of the Swiss party. They came out in machines and from here went to Christie Station, where there is a cheese factory; thence to Mountaineer, and then over to Helvetia, where they stopped with Alfred Guerber a few minutes. Later they drove over to the Nussbaumer neighborhood. The gentlemen were well pleased with Washington County and did not hesitate to express themselves. Two of the party spoke excellent English and two more knew enough of the language to make them fair conversationalists.

While in the city they met with the three Kurathi brothers, Emil, J. C. and County Clerk Kurathi. E. H. Bally, the shoe manufacturer of the party, said that in all his travels he had never seen a country where crops looked better. He said his company manufactures 15,000 pairs shoes daily. He told the Argus that he was enjoying the trip to Oregon immensely.

Mr. Bally and his company's agents bought hides from South America, the United States, and Europe, and their shoes are sold all over the world.

They were very much pleased to find the Oregon Swiss thriving and remarked upon the fact that practically all of them became citizens of the United States, a sister republic. Of course, you know that Switzerland is a republic, and has direct legislation, like Oregon.

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YESTERDAY WAS CITIZENSHIP DAY

Thirteen Men Admitted to Full Membership National Family

FEW CASES PUT OVER

Wives of Twelve Become Citizens on Admittance of Husbands

Yesterday was citizenship day in circuit court, and Judge Bagley, assisted by Naturalization Examiner H. Q. Smith, of Portland, had a strenuous time examining into the qualifications of those who wanted the privileges of American voters. Thirteen men were admitted, and this automatically admitted as citizens their wives. There was but one bachelor in the bunch, and that was Nick Birn, of Laurel, who was a soldier in the late war and thus entitled to citizenship under the law.

He was about to be continued when it was discovered that his son entered the army during the world war—and went into service when he was aged but 18 years. Mr. Smith moved his acceptance and he was made a citizen.
