Go to Tillamook Overland to See Fire Apparatus Work

TOP DECK OF GAS WAGON

Arrive Home in Dead Hours of Night, After Much Grief

Mayor Wall, Fire Chief Frank Waibel, and Councilman J. B. Trullinger went to Tillamook, Sunday, on the hurricane deck of a gas wagon, and they assuredly had a fine trip—only Wall and Waibel smile grimly when they tell you how fine it was. The officials went over with C. C. Clinton and Mr. Bond, who went over to demonstrate what their auto wagon and pump combined can do in the way of putting fire out inside the city limits. The roads were bumpy, but everything went fine until the boys had tire trouble, and then there was much lurching language. They landed in Tillamook in the dead of night, had a demonstration on Monday and returned Monday afternoon and night to Hillsboro, getting in to Hillsboro early Tuesday morning, after another siege of tire trouble with the big 3200 lb machine. Clinton, of course, was all smiles, all the time, for he has known grief many years, having saddled and ridden many an Intertype and Mergenthaler, and he never gets riled at trouble—but Bond chafed greatly, for he wanted to make a good showing with the committee.

Wall says the machine did great work at Tillamook, all right—all right, but he doesn't want to make night rides like that over a hundred miles and back just to see it work—not any more—and the next time the boys come out to demonstrate he is going to have them go no further than Roderick Falls, where he will set fire to his Summer home to give them a chance to demonstrate—but no more Tillamook for him on night runs.

Trullinger, who occasionally views roads with Ben Cornelius, says the trip wasn't half as exciting as a trip to Laurelwood—while Chief Waibel is standing pat and smiling.

BOY KILLED

Earl Stauss, the six year old son of Henry Stauss, of Shady Brook, died Tuesday, between ten and eleven, as the result of a horse dragging the lad nearly a quarter of a mile. Mr. Stauss was leading the animal, and the boy was riding. In some manner the horse became frightened and broke away, dragging the boy, whose right foot had caught in the harness. The boy's abdomen was broken open and one leg was fractured. It is thought the horse must have kicked him in its fright as it was supposed to be very gentle. The boy was living when Dr. E. H. Smith reached the place and after a first aid dressing, was brought to Hillsboro to the Smith hospital. He expired just as he was taken to the operating room. The parents are grief-stricken.

A dead man was found suspended from a tree in the timber near where the Tualatin Valley highway leads into the Terwilliger Boulevard, Sunday. Fifty-four cents were found in the dead man's pockets and a gold watch carried the engraving "Sidney," on the case. The body was badly decomposed, showing that the hanging had perhaps taken place at least two or three months ago. On Monday the body was identified as that of Sidney Wahlpole, a student of O. A. C., who thro all health was forced to leave the school in March, his eyesight having failed. He was to have graduated in 1921 in the course of Forestry. He returned to Portland, and lived at the home of an uncle, and left the Wahlpole home April 19. The young man was an orphan and the supposition is that he became despondent because of loss of vision and failure to remain in the college.

A "bug" and a larger machine met head-on below Newton, Sunday, the result of one getting on the other's right of way. The collision partially wrecked both cars. P. M. VUCASH WANTS COLLISION DAMAGES

Says Griffin Auto Truck Violated Portland Ordinance

WAS STRUCK BY MACHINE

Asks Sum Total of \$1935 for Accident of May 28th

P. M. Vucash has filed a suit in circuit court, asking that Henry Griffin and Fred May contribute the sum of \$1935 to him for an accident which took place on Davis Street, between Fourth and Fifth, Portland, the latter part of May. Vucash says he was crossing the street when the machine came along at 20 miles an hour and tumbled him over, causing him to lose several hundred dollars in labor, a neat little hospital bill and physician's charges. He asks \$1500 damages and the balance goes to make up the sum wanted. He says the driver of the machine was May, while Griffin was, or is, the owner. He suffered a couple of broken ribs; a broken nose, an injured hip, a badly contused shoulder and minor injuries.
