EIGHT CAMPS START ON COLUMBIA

Wheeler Also Starts Logging on P. R. & N.

EXTRA LOGGER GOES ON

Hundreds of Men go Back to Timber

Eighteen big logging camps on the Columbia started up this week, after being closed down since before July 1. The Wheelers, on the P. R. & N. line, northwest of here, have also started their camps, and the logging crews will be put on the run out of Hillsboro at once.

Forest Grove to get new \$15,000 prune packing plant.

Bend—\$120,000 Elks summer home to be built at head of Metolius river.

Good Samaritan hospital, Portland, raising \$300,000 for new wing.

Waldport—Believed spruce railroad and timber land sold for \$2,000,000 to Pittsburg banker.

Marshfield—The burned Smith shingle mill will be rebuilt.

Albany—Local mill installing new machinery; will double output.

Hood River—Concrete paving contract let at \$89,000.

Eugene—Work on women's dormitory begins.

Astoria—New timber company incorporated. Purchases 12,000 acres timber in Klamath county from government.

Springfield—Hatchery reports best run of salmon since establishment.

Albany—Road from Albany to Newport being improved.

Hood River—Two work houses being rushed, estimated at \$40,000.

Albany—Work being rushed on buildings at fair grounds.

Bend—26,000 acres timber tract sells for \$1,000,000.

Albany banks show \$1,004,374.28 increase over last year.

Eugene—New York Shriner purchases \$37,000 ranch.

Dallas—New sawmill to be built near here.

Salem paper mill soon to be operating.

Reedsport—500,000,000 feet of timber on lower Umpqua changes hands, million dollars involved.

Milton box factory turning out capacity output.

Baker—President of First National Bank presents 20 acre fair grounds to city.

Corvallis—Tomato yield of two pounds to the square foot has been produced under glass in the Agricultural College.

Tillamook—Dairy cows of Tillamook county received the highest rating in the Northwest in tests made by Washington State College.

Portland—Keel of the largest vessel ever built in Oregon will be laid in a few days by the Northwest Bridge and Iron Company. Vessel will be 12,000-ton oil tanker. Seven of these crafts are to be built.

Salem—Thousands of cattle from Eastern Oregon being shipped to Montana and Idaho to replenish herds in those states.

Haines—A new 20,000-bushel grain elevator being built here by the Tri-State Terminal Company is complete for installation of machinery.
