

HOSPITAL LOCATES AT CORNELIUS

Central Point Considered Favorably—City Donates 8 Acres

MET THERE LAST MONDAY

Board of Directors to be Named and Fund Campaign to Start

Citizens of Hillsboro and Forest Grove met with Cornelius people and county medical men at Cornelius, Monday night, and start of the ball rolling for a county hospital to be erected at Cornelius on 8 acres donated by the City of Cornelius. The site proposed is on the O. E. in the beautiful grove of oak, and the proposed affair is to cost \$75,000. The idea is to have the hospital as central as possible, between Hillsboro and the Grove, and with an ambulance service connected and a paved highway running East and West, and this condition obtains.

Dr. J. O. Robb called the session to order, and after many expressions of support from Cornelius citizens, officers were elected, viz: Frank S. Sholes, President; Cornelius, pledged to carry out a plan proposed by the Union Building & Loan Association of Portland to finance the institution; C. E. Wells, Hillsboro, vice pres.; B. H. Jonas, Forest Grove and Beaverton, secretary; A. S. Sholes, Cornelius, treasurer. Those speaking for the objective were Drs. Kaufman, Hawke and Robb, and Messrs. Wells, J. A. Jackson, A. S. Sholes, etc.

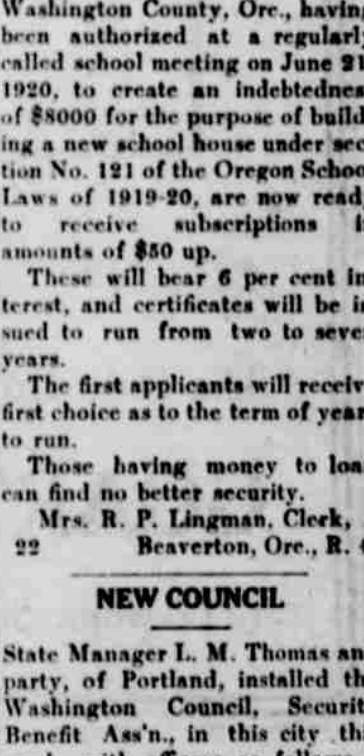

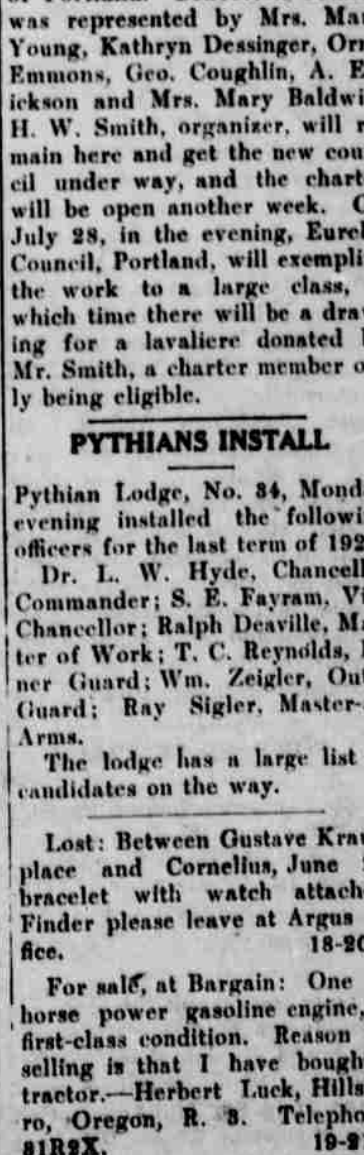
