TO OUR PATRONS

Some unfavorable comment is
being made in regard to the
treatment growers of cherries are
receiving from us, due no doubt,
to our action in declining to re-
ceive rain split or cracked cher-
ries.

As it is impossible for us to
talk this matter over with you
personally, we address to you
this open letter, and trust that it
may result in a better understand-
ing of our relative positions in
the industry and a more full real-
ization upon our part of how es-
sential the success of each of us
is to the other. If we do not
practice good business methods,
competition would soon force us
out of business, which would re-
sult in a loss to us, and to you.
If the production of fruits and
berries for any reason is not
profitable to you, it results in a
loss to you, and to us. So, you
will see, our interests are identi-
cal—and we should neither of us
ask, nor expect of the other, that
which is not reasonable, as usual,
or practical in our business—if
we are to be successful.

In regard to split or cracked
cherries, we want you to know:
That they are absolutely un-
salable when canned.

That one or two split cherries
if found in one can, will condemn
an entire carload.

That no other packers are buy-
ing them nor will receive them.

That even juice pressers have
refused to receive them.

We also want you to know that
the Willamette Valley has one of
the largest cherry crops in his-
tory this season, and that many
packers are refusing to accept
any cherries, regardless of qual-
ity, except those under contract.

That a great many tons of
cherries will go to waste.

That the large markets for
canned fruits show absolutely no

interest in buying at present
prices.

That as a result of the above
conditions, the price of cherries
has steadily declined until today,
many growers in other sections
are offering sound cherries at 3c
and under.

We very much regret the above
conditions which have made it
difficult for us both, but we be-
lieve that you will agree that we
must govern ourselves according-
ly, to safeguard our mutual in-
terests.

We appreciate your interest
and co-operation in the industry,
which we feel safe in saying, will
grow to one of great importance
in our community, and we assure
you that our policy will always
be one of fairness to our patrons.
