CHAS. L. DUBOIS ASKS FOR BIG DAMAGES

Suitor to Recover \$8000 for Auto Motorcycle Collision

SUES THE COUNTY SHERIFF

Says L. O. Stockdale, Patrolman and Deputy Sheriff, Was at Fault

Chas. L. Dubois, of near Orenco, has sued Sheriff Geo. Alexander for \$8,000 for damages alleged to have been inflicted on him when L. O. Stockdale, driving a motorcycle, collided with Dubois' car near Aloha. It will be remembered that Stockdale, while trying to catch a motorcyclist who was speeding, ran into the Dubois Ford, and there was some wreck. Stockdale was unconscious several days, sustaining a terrible head wound. Dubois was put out of business temporarily, and claims that one shoulder is permanently injured. Last week Dubois' attorney secured permission from the Circuit Judge to file a suit against the sheriff, and upon receiving the signature of the court filed the complaint. He wants \$7500 damages in general, and \$500 special damages. He, Dubois, swears that Stockdale was driving the motorcycle at a terrific rate of speed, steering the machine with one hand and shooting at the fugitive with the other hand. It was dark, and Dubois says he tried to get off the highway so as to avoid a collision. He claims the patrolman was on the wrong side of the road, and had lost control of his machine, and he therefore was negligent, and being an appointee of Sheriff Alexander as deputy, the sheriff is liable for damages. Just how the sheriff can be responsible for the act of a deputy in a case of this kind remains to be seen, and the case is therefore watched with interest. Stockdale is again able to resume his duties as patrolman, and considers himself as mighty lucky to have recovered.

KATHERINE E. AKINS

Mrs. Katherine Elizabeth Akins died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Fred Bowdler, South Tualatin, July 28, 1920. She was born at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, April 17, 1850, and was united in marriage to C. J. Akins, in Denver, Colo., August 28, 1879. Four children were born to the union—J. D. Akins, Six Prong, Wash.; C. E. Akins, Rupert, Wash.; Mrs. Jessie Bowdler, Cornelius, R. 2; and Mrs. F. Schlopko, Moran, Wyoming. Mrs. Akins united with the Methodist Episcopal Church at the age of 16 years. The funeral services held at the Lumber Undertaking Parlor, and Rev. Skipworth conducted the service. Interment was in the Hillsboro cemetery, the rites being conducted by the Rebekah Lodge.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

The State Tuberculosis Association sent to Washington County, on experiment, a Public Health Nurse, who was to work for three months at the expense of the State Association.

At the Budget Meeting in December, 1919, an allowance of \$1500 was made by the County for paying her salary for one year from the time that the State Tuberculosis Association had paid for her services. This leaves the State Tuberculosis Association still responsible for the expense actually incurred in doing her work, outside of her salary.

The work of the public health nurse is not alone the investigation of tuberculosis cases, of which there are a large number in this county, but also the work connected with Public Health Welfare. This work includes the investigation of families needing suggestions with regard to Child Welfare, nursing, and caring of expectant mothers.

This work the County Health Nurse has been doing, as far as human strength and ability will go. It is obvious that one nurse cannot do all this work, in detail, for the entire County. The expense incurred is well justified by the results as the doctors of the county could testify.

This statement is made for the enlightenment of some who consider that the expense is not justified by the results of the work required.

AUTO DEALERS MEET TO ORGANIZE

Washington County Automotive Assn. is Formed

New Assn. Starts Out With Membership of Eighteen

The Washington County Automotive Association was organized at the Hillsboro Club rooms Monday evening. Twenty-eight dealers, accessory and repair men were in attendance from various parts of the county.

Robt. E. Magner, field secretary of the National Automobile Dealers' Association and secretary pro tem of the Oregon Automotive Dealers, was here to assist in the organization.

The dealers met at 7 o'clock in the dining room of the Washington Hotel for dinner and twenty-four were present at this important part of the meeting.

After they dined they gathered in the Hillsboro Club rooms. After listening to a very interesting address by Mr. Magner on the purposes of the organization, the dealers voted to organize and call themselves the Washington County Automotive Association.

M. P. Cady, of Hillsboro, was elected president; J. W. Philpot, of Gaston, 1st vice president; Albert Losli, of Beaverton, 2nd vice president, and R. E. Loomis, of Forest Grove, secretary-treasurer.

The Washington County organization starts off with a membership of eighteen, which is one of the largest of any county organization in the state.

It is planned to hold meetings monthly, alternating between Hillsboro and Forest Grove. The next meeting being held at the Laughlin Hotel, Forest Grove, at 7 o'clock, Thursday evening, August 5.

PROCLAMATION

State of Oregon, Executive Department, Salem.

At the request of the Navy Department, I have this day issued the following proclamation calling for five hundred recruits to fill vacancies on board Uncle Sam's fighting ships. The United States Government has asked the State of Oregon for five hundred good, clean young men for the months of July and August to help fill the vacancies in the Navy caused by the granting of discharges to men who enlisted only for the duration of the war.

The Congress of the United States has recently seen fit to increase the pay of all ranks and ratings of the Navy to bring the compensation of men in the service to a par with that of those in other occupations.

Our Navy, often termed the Nation's first line of defense, is recognized here as elsewhere as of the utmost importance, and it must be kept up to the full standard of its strength. To its enlisted personnel the United States Navy offers fair treatment, and opportunity for education, wholesome recreation, interesting and instructing travel, and a general atmosphere of right living and right thinking. The Navy provides a training that any young man will find of marked value throughout his lifetime.

I therefore respectfully ask that the people of the State of Oregon co-operate with the Navy in securing its enlisted quota and that the young men of our state give to the Navy their serious consideration.
