THRESHERS MEET

About 15 threshermen met Saturday evening at the Hillsboro Club rooms and talked over affairs usually taken up at their annual session. Eight new members came into the organization. Wm. Hanson was elected to succeed himself as president and Arthur D. Hill was re-elected secretary-treasurer. Threshermen are up against higher wages to employ supplies, etc., than ever before, and at the same rates for threshing as have prevailed in the past they must operate at a loss.

It was learned that this year's threshing prices will be 5 cents for oats and 8 cents for wheat in the valleys and 6 and 9 cents in the hill districts. Small settings will be threshed for from \$12.50 to \$20.

Engineers will cost threshermen a dollar an hour this year.

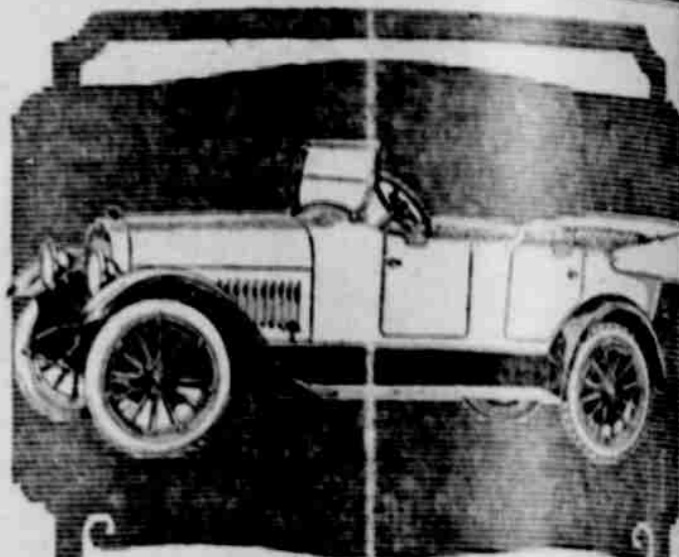
