

THRESHERS START TURNING OUT GRAIN

Winter Wheat Yields all the Way From 25 to 50 Bushels Per Acre

GRAIN ACREAGE IS LARGE

Banner Yield so Far is on the Frahl Ranch—50 Bushels Per Acre

Threshers started up the last of the week, and the separators are busy turning out grain in almost every section of Washington County. Weather conditions so far have been ideal for the work and many farms are threshing from the shock. Here and there, however, growers are stacking, taking no chances on a change of weather and possible rain. Winter wheat is yielding well; the bulk of the crop averaging around 30 bushels per acre. Here and there is found a greater yield, many going 40 bushels. The banner yield so far is reported from the Frahl ranch, southeast of the city, which went 50 bushels per acre. Oats are a little more or less disappointing, as they are not turning out as well as expected in many sections. It was thought the July rains would be of vast benefit to this crop, but the hot weather following the precipitation ripened the heads too rapidly to fill well.

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COUNTY MERCHANTS FORM ASSOCIATION

Will Promote Legitimate Business and Fight Illegitimate

J. H. GARRETT IS PRESIDENT

Business Men Meet at the Hotel Washington and Have Dinner

Representative merchants of the county met in Hillsboro Friday evening, and after a dinner at the Hotel Washington, proceeded to organize the Washington County Merchants' Ass'n. The president and secretary of the State Merchants' Ass'n were present and delivered addresses and dwelt upon the fact that exchange of ideas was a mighty good thing for business men generally. Mr. McClain, secretary of the state body, presided as temporary chairman at the meeting which followed the dinner, and J. A. Black, of the Hillsboro Mercantile, was named as secretary. A draft of a constitution and by-laws was read and adopted, and officers were elected as follows:

The meeting voted to permit the five directors to name the sixth to serve from Gaston, and the six will elect four more, making a board of ten. Meetings will be held quarterly, on the second Mondays of January, April, July and October, at 8 p. m., and special meetings will be called by the board of directors.

The association will make a specialty of fighting dishonest labels on merchandise, and will have a voice in determining what is honest advertising, and a committee will pass on appeals for advertising and donations from merchants. Newspaper advertising and announcements in telephone directories will be left to the discretion of the individual merchants.

Merchants felt that it was time to get together and cultivate a fraternal spirit and cooperate along many lines. The board of directors will meet once each of the months that there are no association meetings.

John R. Olden Gets Foreclosure Decree for Over \$23,000

CONDITIONS NOT GOOD

High Prices of Potatoes Mean Unprofitable Operation

John R. Olden, of Heppner, thro his attorneys, Hare, McAlear & Peters, last week secured a decree of foreclosure against the Pacific Potato Starch Co., whose plant is located at Beaverton. The high price of potatoes the past two years made it impossible for the company to operate at a profit, and Mr. Olden, having financed the property, concluded it was time to take things over. The decree orders the sale of the realty, the machinery and the entire plant, and allows the defendant company to be a purchaser at the sale.

The suit of H. A. Purcell and John M. Wall against Ward Ennis, asking for payment for a broken window in a restaurant, was non-suited, and the suing parties must pay the costs.
