J. T. Melloy died at his home at Twelfth and Oak, early Monday morning, August 23, 1920. Mr. Melloy was convalescing from an attack of pneumonia, and had been up and around the house Sunday, entertaining his son and family, of Beaverton. He retired feeling fairly well, and did not complain to Mrs. Melloy. Early in the morning she awakened and spoke to him. There was no answer and investigation disclosed the fact that he had passed away while asleep, ostensibly from heart trouble.

He is survived by his widow and the following children by a former marriage—Richard Melloy, Beaverton, and Mrs. Mary Johnson, of Salt Lake. Of his immediate family he is survived by the following sisters and brothers: Mrs. Kate Hanson, of Portland; Mrs. Lulu Decker and Mrs. Edith Rawlins, of Lincoln, Nebraska, and Albert Melloy, of Lingle, Wyoming.

The funeral takes place Friday

morning, Donelson & Bell directing, interment to be in the Catholic cemetery.

Mr. Melloy resided in Salt Lake many years, and was connected with the police force of that city for an extended period. He moved to Oregon about fifteen years ago, and resided at Beaverton until about two and a half years ago, when he settled North of Hillsboro. A few months ago he sold his place and bought in Hillsboro.

Mr. Melloy was highly esteemed and made many friends during his residence here and at Beaverton.

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MRS. ANTHOY HEESACKER

Mrs. Anthoy Heesacker, one of Verboort's respected citizens, passed away on the morning of August 20, 1920. For some years she had been failing in health and death brought no surprise.

Anna Maria DeGroot was born at Reek, North Brabant, Netherlands, Jan. 17, 1847. She came to America in early youth with her brothers and sisters (her father died at sea) and settled at DePere, Wis. There in October 1867, she was united in the bonds of matrimony to Anthoy Heesacker. The couple resided in Wisconsin for 13 years when the call of the West brought them to Verboort, Oregon, a little hamlet named to commemorate its founder, Rev. Wm. A. Verboort. Eleven children were born to the union, one dying in infancy. The husband and father died in 1890.

Left a widow with ten children, the youngest a babe of three months, this devoted mother struggled through life with one idea, one consuming ambition—to rear a family of sons and daughters who would be a credit to God and country.

George Campbell, of the Cathedral, acted as Master of Ceremonies, and His Grace, Archbishop Christie, of Portland, preached the funeral oration. The funeral was attended by a large concourse of friends.

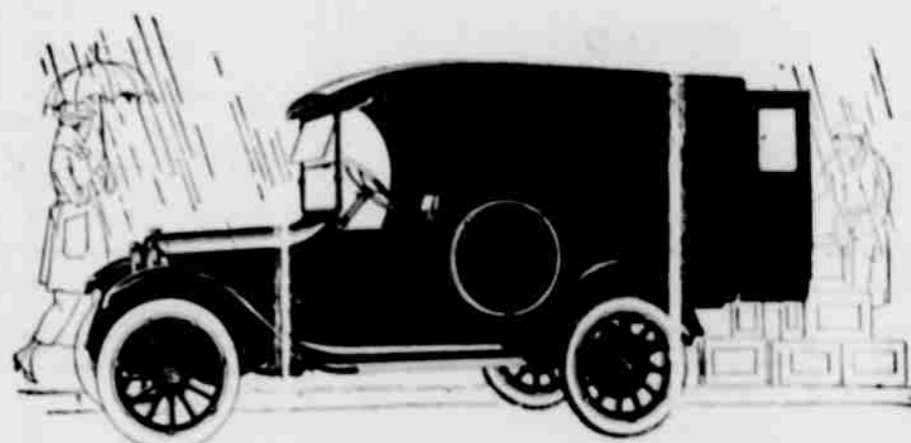
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
