Wheeler Estate Starts the Camps Cleaning up Eleven Million Feet

FUTURE IS YET IN THE AIR

Plant May be Sold, or Estate May Operate it Next Year

The Southern Pacific Company last week started the second logging train on the Tillamook line out of Hillsboro, the Wheeler plant having again resumed operations. The estate of the late owner of the logging plant will yard out and ship all the logs which have been cut, and cut only timber which is in proximity, and can be handled without breaking new ground. This means perhaps eleven million feet of merchantable timber, and the action of the estate thereafter is now a matter of conjecture.
