Management Putting up a Four Thousand Dollar Building

TWO DAYS OF EXHIBIT

Thursday and Friday, Oct. 21 and 22 to Show Cattle and Hogs

While other sections of Washington county talk spasmodically about having fairs and shows without results, the progressive farmers of Banks and vicinity are each year holding a dairy and hog show that is a credit to any community. The management has set Thursday and Friday, October 21 and 22, for their 1920 showing and the board of directors are putting up a four thousand dollar building so the exhibits will be housed and people can attend regardless of weather conditions and see what the section can produce in the way of registered stock. The building will be sufficiently large to permit of a judging ring.

Southern Pacific to Connect Near Banks With G. C. and W. R. road
