RETURN CHAMBERLAIN

There are many reasons why Senator Chamberlain should receive the vote of Oregon. His record as Governor, although opposed by the stand-patters, was such that it gave him his second term. He shoved the land grabbers out of the state house; he withdrew sales of school lands which had been selling at under prices, and saved the state millions for its school fund. This is history. As United States Senator he has worked faithfully for the state, and during the war he made a national reputation by his insistence that service men should have their dues. Fathers and mothers of service men know this. They know that he is honest, capable and energetic. He has served the state without stint of effort, and he has been the senator of a whole people—not of a part. He has been foremost in progressive legislation at the National capital, and he is worthy of your support, regardless of your political faith.

WHY DRIVE OUT CAPITAL?

Those who are interested in the welfare of the state and want manufacturing capital to locate here in order that Oregon may save the freight from the East

will do well to hunt the ballot for that "five per cent interest measure" and vote "No." The measure is visionary in the extreme and should get no support from those who wish the state to prosper. If it shall pass capital headed this way for industrial purposes will go to other states. Under such a law, there could be no expansion along industrial lines. Oregon is too progressive to tie the state up in a sack, and send money to adjacent states, and the measure should be overwhelmingly defeated. The Argus holds no brief for money loaner, for he will take care of himself. But it does not wish to see the state hampered by legislation of this kind. Washington, California and Idaho are watching Oregon, and gleefully hoping the measure will pass for it will mean industrial development for them while Oregon will suffer. Kill the bill and you will have done a good day's work on November 2.
