NEW RAIL LINE TO OPERATE NEXT YEAR

Portland, Astoria & Pacific Ry. to Run Trains

TRACK TO THE NEHALEM

Will Get Into Portland on United Railway Lease

The Portland, Astoria & Pacific Railway Co. will have track laid from Banks clear over the divide into the Nehalem via Buxton and the Beaver Creek route by next June, and trains will be operating in July, according to the latest advices from officials of the road. This will mean another line for Washington County, and as the company will operate the United Railway line it will add to the value of that railway as a means of transportation.

The new road taps a big timber region in the Nehalem, and will enter a field as yet untouched by a rail line.

Eugene—Contracts are let for park building.

St. Helens—New church under construction.

Portland has the largest covered pier in the United States, the structure being 1,500 by 183 feet.

Salem—\$100,000 American Fly and Rodent Destroyer Company incorporates to make manufacturing headquarters here.

Colton—Water company files application for water from Canyon Creek for domestic and irrigation purposes.

Dallas—Voters to be asked to vote bonds for hard surfaced roads within this district.

Milton—Much building being done here.

Hood River—New Park street school progressing.

Cottage Grove—Prune orchard produces five tons to acre.

Sheridan—Ryan sawmill in Gopher Valley resumes operations.

Noble Lad's Lady Helen No. 364050 Second Year of Registry

NEARLY DOUBLES 1ST TEST

Turns Out 776.66 Pounds of Butter Fat With 12,962 Pounds Milk

Geo. Biersdorf's registered Jersey cow, Noble Lad's Lady Helen No. 364050 Second Year of Registry, has completed her second register-of-merit record with a production of 12,962.1 pounds of milk or 776.66 pounds of butter fat, the test starting when she was four years and 4 months old. The production exceeded her first test by 300 pounds of fat.

Her sire, Helen's Noble Lad 118133, has five (5) daughters in the Register of Merit. His sire, Monmouth Noble 98992, has three (3) daughters and one (1) son in the Register of Merit. The paternal granddam of Noble Lad's Lady Helen, Helen Oot 229047, has a Register of Merit record of 505 pounds fat.

Noble Lad's Lady Helen is out of Princess Roxana 313739, a Register of Merit cow with a record of 492 pounds fat. Her sire, Golden Maid's Prince 94944 has nine (9) daughters in the Register of Merit. Her dam Roxana Fern 284377 has two Register of Merit daughters.

Lady Helen was bred and is owned by Mr. Biersdorf, who has a fine herd on North Tualatin Plains.

That she has inherited all the characteristics of her ancestors is a certainty, and with the favorable conditions Oregon offers its dairy cows it will not be surprising if she comes back with a better record next year.

The splendid sales by Mr. Biersdorf are conclusive proof that it pays to produce register-stock. His dairy and herd were visited by the Jersey Club members last Spring when they visited in Oregon.

LIMBER BUYS

Geo. J. Limber, County Coroner, and Undertaker, has bought the W. H. Wehrung property on the corner of Sixth and Washington, and has carpenters at work on extensive improvements for his undertaking business. He will erect a stock room on the west of the main wing, enlarge his chapel and build a verandah on the entire north front.
