MRS. MARY LEDFORD

Mrs. Mary Leford died at the family home October 22, 1920, from a stroke of paralysis. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald McLoud, pioneers of Washington County, and was born at Gaston, Jan. 11, 1854. She resided at Gaston through her girlhood, and was married to Geo. T. Leford, a veteran of the Civil War, November 11, 1877. They moved to Hillsboro to reside, the husband being one of the pioneer confectioners and barbers of the county seat. The husband died several years ago. To the union were born nine children, four of whom survive—George B. Leford, engineer at the Pacific Coast Condensed Milk Co's plant, Hillsboro; Grover C. Leford, a veteran of the world war; Hazel D. Leford, a housewife of Portland; Mrs. Wm. H. Bagley, of Gales Creek. A daughter, Miss Inah Leford, a professional nurse, died during the war, after reaching Paris, where she was engaged in nursing the American wounded. Of her immediate family she is survived by two brothers, Jobe

McLoud and Albert McLoud, both of Independence.
Mrs. Leford was a member of the United Evangelical Church and for many years was a member of the Woman's Relief Corps of Gen. Ransom Post. She was a woman of very tender heart and was always ready to lend a helping hand to those who were ill or dependent.
The funeral took place the first of the week, Rev. Stover conducting the service. Interment was in the Masonic Cemetery, Undertaker Bell directing.

J. D. MERRYMAN

John D. Merryman died at his home at Klamath Falls, Ore., October 26, 1920, the result of a stroke of paralysis. He was born in Ohio in 1838 and served in the Civil War. After coming West he was Collector of Customs at Astoria. He was married to Rebecca Engleton, in Hillsboro, in the Summer of 1870, and a few weeks ago they celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. For many years he resided in Hillsboro, and was Cashier of the first bank established in Hillsboro, the First National, organized by J. W. Shute. After leaving Hillsboro Mr. Merryman was cashier at the custom house in Portland.
He is survived by his widow and the following children: Mrs. A. B. Bailey, Portland; Adrian, a druggist, Tacoma, Wn.; Dr. Geo. Merryman, Klamath Falls; Mrs. Herbert Moulton, New York, and Harold Merryman, practicing law at Klamath Falls.
Interment will be at Klamath Falls.

G. N. Taggart went to Portland last night to hear "Go to Hell" Whittlesley, a republican, who spoke for the League of Nations at the Auditorium. The speaker was in command of the lost battalion, which was cooped up by the Germans in a hopeless situation. His bravery caused the German commander to offer a magnanimous surrender, but the American promptly told the German to "go to hell" that he would fight to the last ditch. He fought it out until reinforcements came and rescued him. Mr. Taggart says the speaker made telling points.

Eloise Newton, who married L. L. Newton at Tacoma in 1905, asks for a divorce, alleging that the husband has not supported the wife and the minor daughter, aged 13 years, and that the head of the family was prone to call the wife vile names—too vile to read into the complaint. 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Made of Copper Throughout and Best Yet Uncovered Here

HOOTCH CAN AT TOBIAS

H. E. Graiff and Two Austrians in Caliboose—30 Gallons Taken

Sheriff Alexander this week sent Deputies Redmond, Weckert and Stockdale to Tobias, between Reedville and Aloha, where they captured one of the finest stills yet uncovered in Washington County. The apparatus was of copper throughout, and had a capacity of about 25 gallons per run. A copper worm was manufactured from a Raud heater coil, and the still was attached to an oil stove, which had compressed air to force the heat. Everything was as neat as a pin about the plant and if the gang did not make good "cooking" whiskey it was because they did not know how to operate.

The plant was captured at the tract of H. E. Graiff, and was located in his barn. Sweko Topich and Mike Susner, two Austrians, were captured with Graiff, and the trio were landed in the county jail on a warrant out of the county court.

About thirty gallons of liquor was brought to the county seat. It was in new kegs, and is said to be a good blend. As soon as an official taster is induced to sample the stuff, and the grand jury meets, the three Austrians will be taken before the inquisitorial body.

It is said that frequent trips to the place by strangers caused the investigation.
