DAIRY COMMENT

In the Cow Testing Association reports of Oregon for the month of September, E. B. Fitts, Extension Dairyman comments as follows:

"The price of feeds has been high, but not too high to return a profit to the man who makes intelligent use of them. If we will look around among the dairy farmers we will find that the man who feeds his cows well is the one who makes the most money. The cow makes milk and profit to her owner from the last part of the ration and not from the first. Sixty to seventy-five per cent of a full ration goes to maintain the cow's body, and it is a short sighted policy to withhold the 25 per cent that returns the profit and keeps the cow in good working condition. Yearly milk production can often be increased 25 per cent by an increase of 10 per cent in feed costs. If feed is scarce it is much better to sell the poorer cows and feed the remaining ones well rather than to keep all on a skimpy ration. Feed prices are coming down and we should feed well this winter to get our cows in good condition for next year's work. Good feeding pays big dividends."
