EDITOR DEMANDS \$20,000

St. Helens, Ore., Nov. 7.—(Special.)—Ham Kautzman, formerly publisher of the Columbia Herald and now publisher of the Tualatin Valley News, has filed a damage suit against Glen R. Metsker, district attorney of Columbia county and E. C. Stanwood, formerly sheriff of the county. Kautzman asked for \$20,000 and in his complaint charged that he was wrongfully prosecuted in an attempt to force him to leave St. Helens and cease the publication of the Herald.

The suit is the aftermath of a heated controversy between Metsker and Kautzman. Kautzman was indicted on 31 different counts for publishing articles in his paper. He was found guilty on two counts and sentenced to six months in jail and fined \$500. —Oregonian.

SOME RECORD

Sixteen Benton county children out of thirty-eight examined were found under-weight in child nutrition tests conducted under the supervision of the agricultural college home demonstration department. Other results of malnutrition showed up, as narrow chest in 11 children, flat feet in 2, decayed teeth in 1, excessive wax in ear in 6, adenoids in 6, diseased tonsils in 10, hernia in 2, and nose disease in 9. These conditions are typical throughout Oregon and the United States so far as revealed by child welfare work. The home demonstration people help parents correct the feeding habits directly responsible. —O. A. C.

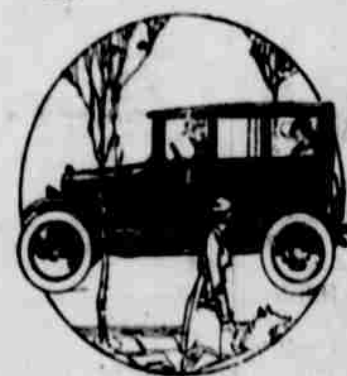
