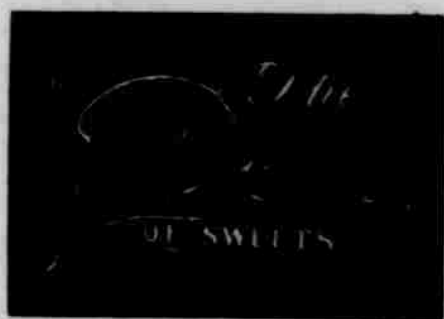

SMALL TRACT LIFE SAVER

A new year is nearly here, and farmers will soon begin to lay their plans for next year's crops.

Small fruits such as strawberries, raspberries, loganberries, etc., have played such an important part in farm and community development in recent years that ever increasing acreage is being set out. The total amount of acreage now planted, however, is only a drop in the bucket when compared to the world market that is being developed by the canneries for these fruits.

If we fill the demand that is now being created we must raise larger crops and encourage the expansion of canning and preserving industries. The canner has really been the life savor of the small tract farmer as it has furnished him a market for everything he could raise. Hillsboro has the best field in the state for small fruit culture.

Now is the time for Hillsboro to start a movement for a county showing along productive and industrial lines. Hillsboro is centrally located, is easy of access, both by highway and train service, and the adjoining of the baseball block and the Shute Park grounds would form an ideal place for a county fair. Successful seeding of fall grain or vetch this late is shallow and at a higher rate than for September seeding. Winter oats call for not less than 2 1/2 bushels per acre, winter barley 2 or 2 1/2 bushels, winter wheat not less than 2 bushels and common vetch 80 pounds with 40 pounds of gray winter oats. As the seed bed is rather moist, seeding should be as near one inch in depth as possible.—Farm Crops, O. A. C.
