

ARMISTICE DAY PROGRAM IS OUT

Boys in Uniform Will Parade, Also G. A. R. and Auxiliaries

MAJ. HUMPHREYS TO TALK

Will Form at Court House at Two O'clock, Thursday P. M., Nov. 11

American Legion Post No. 6 has completed all arrangements for an Armistice Day celebration to be held here on Thursday afternoon, Nov. 11, and the boys are going to make this initial demonstration a success. The business houses will be asked to close in the afternoon.

The speaker of the day will be Major Lester W. Humphreys, who saw service in France. He is the present United States District Attorney for Oregon, and ranks high as an attorney as well as a soldier.

The ex-service men in uniform will rendezvous at the court house at 1:45, and the parade will start promptly at 2 o'clock. The Ladies Auxiliary will lead the parade, followed by the service men. The G. A. R., of Gen. Ran-son Post, the Woman's Relief Corps, the Boy Scouts and the Girl's Reserves will be in the line of parade. Returning to the court house square the gun given the city by the U. S. government will be "mounted" and the exercises will follow.

There will be a big dance at Moose Hall in the evening, under the auspices of the American Legion Post. The public is cordially invited to attend the afternoon program, and to visit Moose Hall in the evening. Members of the Legion Ball team are invited to attend the ball as guests of the Post, free of charge.

ALL TO CLOSE

The garages, of course, will keep a man on shift in order to give gas to those in need of power. Even the confectioneries will close for the stipulated period.

The Hillsboro team will play Estacada today (Armistice Day) on the local grounds.

Territory Covers East End of Washington County

SCHOOL DISTRICT SYSTEM

Sends Out Circular Letter to Start Things Going

H. A. Deck has been appointed Chairman of the Red Cross Drive which starts today, and the following letter, sent out over his signature, explains itself:

Dear Fellow workers: No doubt you are aware of the fact that Washington County has organized as a Chapter of the American Red Cross. Hitherto we have been a Branch of the Portland Chapter. From now on the percentage of funds, allotted to local chapters, will remain in the hands of the Executive Committee of the Washington County Chapter, to be distributed as it shall direct.

The Chairman of the Washington County Chapter has asked me to take charge of the Fourth Annual Membership Drive, for the east end of the county. The drive begins Nov. 11 and continues until the 25th.

Under separate cover we are sending the necessary material for the drive in your school district. Receipt books will be used this year instead of roll sheets. The receipt to be given to the subscriber, the stub to remain in the book. The window display Red Crosses for those who subscribe and buttons are under separate cover.

As you have had the work in hand before it is not necessary to give you detailed instructions. Will you not, with those you can rely on your assistance, give every one in your district a chance to enroll?

As soon as possible after the returns from your district have been handed to you, please forward the receipt books sent to you, whether used or otherwise, and all monies to me.

The work of the Red Cross is not done, as the records show. In our county during the year, the Red Cross has helped on an average 44 families (of ex-service men) per month, at a cost of about \$100 per month. And this is only one phase of the work.

In behalf of the officers of the county, permit me to thank you for your past co-operation and your assistance in this, another drive.

CO-OPERATION IS HELPING GROWERS

Now Has Total Membership of 1554 in State

BODY DOING GREAT WORK

County has Quite a Membership in Organization

Washington County has quite a membership in the Oregon Growers' Co-operative Association, the report of which follows:

With the closing of the pool opened the last two weeks of October, the Oregon Growers' Co-operative Association announces a total membership of 1,554, with a total acreage of 28,000.

During the two weeks the pool was open, especially for pruned men, 90 new members were received, bringing in more than 1,000 acres. As most of the orchards are heavy producers, this will add fully 2,000,000 pounds of prunes in normal years.

In a report just issued, the Association announces that up to October 7, sales for the three previous months amounted to \$564,676.21, and this included only a few shipments of fall pears and apples.

By watching the auction market in the east, the f. o. b. market, and at the same time keeping the canneries supplied, the sales department of the Association was able to sell on a strong market, and to prevent at any time an overstocked market.

Already the Association has shipped more than 600 cars of fresh fruit, including berries, plums, early pears and apples, up to the time of the October 7 statement. It is estimated that before the season closes, the additional sales of apples will amount to more than 600 cars.

Loganberries are becoming one of the big crops of the valley according to the report. The total sales by the Oregon Growers the past season amounted to \$137,230.09.

Plums, which are not regarded seriously as money makers, but to members of the Association this year \$2,142.70, which to an extent was pick-up money. One variety sold for \$3.60 a bushel.

Dried cherries valued at \$13,450 have been sold and shipped by the Association, every dollar of which would have been lost on account of the unusual rains during the picking season. The Oregon Growers, at the critical time, took these cracked cherries, dried and prepared them for shipment and marketed them for the \$13,450.

Both white and black cherries were sold this season by the Association for 13 cents a pound, and this is also a matter of record that no other growers association in the state secured for its members such a favorable price.

The total amount of cherries marketed by the Oregon Growers, according to the October 7 statement, was for this season the sum of \$118,566.12. The Royal Anne easily led with sales of \$93,015.97, while the Lambert and Bing pool brought in \$24,068.85.

With sales already running more than half a million dollars up to October 7 this season, and also taking into consideration favorable prices received, from all reports there is a feeling of satisfaction and confidence among the members of the Association.

AS TO ENSILAGE

Packing silage is probably the place in making silage where most mistakes are made, according to O. A. C. authorities. The task of packing should not be trusted to a mere boy, or to an inexperienced hired man. Several of the best men on the farm should put into the silo.

If the silage is not well packed the air will not be excluded and the silage will become moldy and spoil. It will settle and draw away from the silo wall and thus will let in the air.

Two or three good men in a silo are perhaps enough with a small cutter. One man should carry the distributor and the other two do the tramping. Three to six men besides the man carrying the distributor are required with a large cutter. Silage should be built up higher and tramped more firmly at the edge of the silo than at the center, but the center must not be neglected. The more nearly the silo becomes filled the harder it should be packed.

Silage should have enough moisture so that on squeezing water drops away fairly freely. If it is not wet enough water should be added. This is best accomplished by running a stream of water into the blower.

The defense has as yet filed no answer to the complaint.

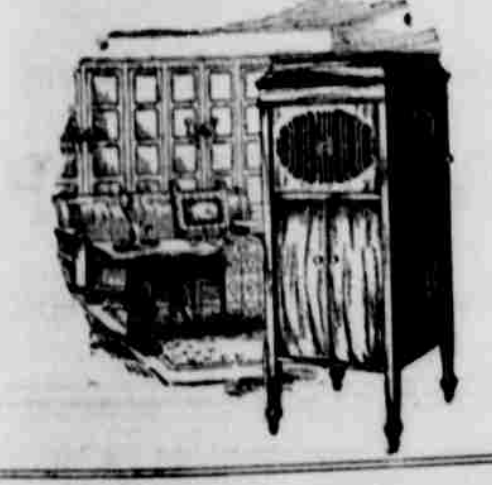
