

COUNTY TAKES THE GUERNSEY PRIZES

At the Pacific International Livestock Show at Portland

SENIOR AND GRAND CHAMP

W. A. Goodin's Herd Given Signal Honors at the Big Show

Washington County was again in the front at the Pacific International Livestock Show. More prizes were awarded to the registered Guernsey herd of W. A. Goodin than to any other breeder of registered stock upon the number of animals exhibited. Goodin's herd of registered Guernseys captured six first prizes, four seconds, one third and one fourth. Wilson's Fat, owned by Goodin, was selected first in her class, senior champion and grand champion among the Guernseys. This is the first Grand Champion cow owned by a Washington County resident to be selected at the Pacific International Livestock show.

Goodin's herd now takes rank as one of the best herds of the country. Not only have his cattle qualified in the show ring, but his herd now holds the northwest record among the Guernseys for milk and butter fat. The herd combines both type of breed and production. Fancy prices have been offered to Goodin for his prize winners, which have been declined, for the reason that it is his purpose to further improve and develop the herd.

The Pacific International Livestock Show is today by far the largest livestock show conducted within the United States. Washington County has been significantly honored by the victory scored by the Goodin herd.

Discuss Questions Tuesday, at Big Meeting

LUNCH OF MILK PRODUCTS

Alma D. Katz, State President, Makes Address

Five hundred Washington County dairymen attended the meeting of the Oregon Dairy League at Hillsboro, Tuesday. Questions relating to the progress and future plans of the League were discussed by Alma D. Katz, President of the Oregon Dairymen's League. M. S. Shrock, Organization Manager, and C. D. Tyler, Treasurer of the League, and J. D. Mickle, State Dairy and Food Commissioner, also discussed different phases of the dairy situation.

The noon lunch consisted of bottled milk, cheese sandwiches and doughnuts, and was served on the court house lawn. The cheese was produced in the new cheese factories of the League, and was pronounced by many at the luncheon as being the best they had ever eaten.

Dairymen especially have been subject to severe losses in their business, due to depression of the dairy markets which has been brought about by the difference in the rate of exchange between this and foreign countries. It was pointed out repeatedly how the League had assisted its membership during this period of market depression.

The best of spirit prevailed at the meeting, even in the face of the downward trend of prices of dairy products and high feed and labor costs. The dairymen in attendance at the meeting generally expressed confidence in their move towards co-operative marketing as a means of stabilizing the dairy industry, and in further building up the agriculture of the county.

HINCKLEY PAROLED

Harry Hinckley, forger, pleaded guilty to issuing bad paper, and was sentenced to twelve years, three years each on four counts. He was paroled during good behavior, but is to pay the costs of the court, and is to pay his mother, through the county clerk, \$15 at the rate of \$20 per month. The mother reimbursed those who loaned on the young man's transactions. He must not leave the state, and the parole will be revoked upon bad behavior.

Arthur Winter pleaded guilty and was fined \$50. Upon payment of \$10 he was paroled during good conduct. The other two indictments were dismissed.

E. R. Dollman was given one year in the penitentiary and the costs were taxed against him. Peter Rithaler, who robbed the L. A. Jackson store, was given ten years on two counts of burglary, and paroled. Rithaler is to repay the loss by reason of his theft at \$20 monthly; must keep away from pool halls, and report every month, with \$20 to apply on the costs of the case.

The case of Ludwig Nichtmann versus Alfred Cummings, suit on account, ended in a verdict for Cummings.

RED CROSS BUSHES AID IN EXPLOSION ON WALL STREET

According to the superintendents of the Broad Street and Volunteer hospitals of New York, the work of the Red Cross after the recent Wall street explosion proved almost invaluable. The explosion happened at noon on September 16. Red Cross ambulance units with those of downtown hospitals and the police department, were on the scene in time for first aid work. But the principal activity of the Red Cross was to assist the hospitals to which the injured were taken. Before the afternoon had passed 92 nurses had gone to aid the regular forces at the Broad Street and Volunteer hospitals. Eighteen Red Cross field directors assisted in hospitals and in compiling and furnishing information concerning dead and injured. Large quantities of hospital supplies and apparatus were furnished, as well as food. Three ambulances and two trucks were on duty, and through the Red Cross social service the matter of getting in touch with the families of victims was competently handled.

The Red Cross Remembers. Ever since demobilization the Red Cross has kept in constant touch with the families of 800,000 soldiers and sailors and marines. This service has embraced almost everything from supplying first aid to seeing a man through to a better job than he ever had before.

When Disaster Comes. Last year in the United States, the Red Cross aided more than 30,000 victims of flood, fire, tornado or other unavoidable disaster in 150 stricken communities.

CHILDREN'S FARM

Portland, Ore., Nov. 24—(Special)—An intensive campaign is being carried on in every part of Oregon this week in a determined effort to obtain the \$125,000 fund for the children's farm home for the Oregon W. C. T. U. Every effort will be made to obtain the desired quotas in every county during the present week, according to John E. Wheeler, state chairman of the campaign drive committee.

Hood River county is the first in the state to report its completed quota. With Leslie Butler, prominent Hood River banker, as its chairman, the county committee perfected its organization before the opening day of the drive and the full quota had been procured on the opening day. Not content with the mere quota, the field workers labored throughout the week with the result that many communities in Hood River county doubled their quotas.

The \$125,000 is being sought for the establishment of a model farm home for orphan and dependent children. The movement is being mothered by the Oregon W. C. T. U., and is being supported by child welfare workers and state officials throughout Oregon. Governor Oleott and others have declared it to be one of the most worthy enterprises undertaken in behalf of children in this state for many years.

NEW AUTO LAW BEING FRAMED BY COMMITTEE

Expect to Present Bill for Legislature This Winter

TO STOP BEFORE CROSSING

Engineers on Railways are Behind Proposed Measure

Railway engineers on all lines in Oregon are getting behind a proposed bill to present to the coming legislature with the hopes of stopping the wholesale killings on railway crossings. The new measure is modeled after laws in two or three Eastern states, and one of the requirements is that people driving machines must come to a full stop before crossing any railway track.

Engineers urge that this takes but a half minute of time and that the precaution will put a stop to the needless killings which have occurred from time to time by machines trying to beat out a railway train.

Engineer Tibbitts, who runs on the S. P. Electric through the city, is on the committee arranging the features of the proposed law, and he says that in states where it has been adopted, the percentage of death losses is very small as compared with states where no law has been enacted.

Anyone who has been in train service realizes the necessity of some laws governing the action of auto drivers where railroad tracks are involved.

Washington County has not been free from deaths due to collisions on crossings. Three killed near Reedville a few years ago, and one killed in Hillsboro this Summer, and one killed here several years ago, besides several near-fatality accidents here and there in Washington County have been incidents that make officials and railway men earnest in their desires to have a measure enacted at the coming session of the legislature.
