DAVID BROOKS

David Brooks, who died at Gresham, Ore., at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Richard Beadle, Nov. 25, 1920, was born in 1843, near Ottawa City, Canada, and moved to Iowa in 1870. Fourteen years later he moved to Western Oregon and settled in Lane county, where he resided for nineteen years. His wife died seven years ago, and for nearly eleven years he made his home with Wm. P., a son who resides at Hazeldele. The surviving children are John M., of Chico, Cal.; Wm. P., of Hazeldele, Beaverton, R. 4; Joseph S., of Wasco, Ore., and Mrs. Richard Beadle, of Gresham.

Of his immediate family he is survived by five sisters, two of whom reside in Oregon—Mrs. Rachel Tisdale, Portland, and Mrs. John Conley, of Gresham. The funeral took place Sunday and interment was in the Cooper Mountain cemetery.

CREAMERY MEN WISE UP

Oregon creamery men, actual and prospective, are planning to enroll in large numbers in the eight weeks' dairy manufacture short course at the agricultural college, opening January 3. Separate courses will run for the skilled creamery man and the inexperienced man. The dairy department handles about 110,000 lbs. of butter annually, 200 gallons of market milk daily, cheese up to as nearly 5000 pounds of milk daily as they can get, and a big ice cream output on a brand new 50-quart Perfection Dreadnaught brine freezer. The latest and most profitable processes in these departments will be offered the practicing milk products men of the state.
