Local Eleven Wins Half of Season's Games

Hilli Wins Victory in the Second Quarter

Defeating the Gresham High eleven here last Thursday, by a score of 7-0, the Hillsboro high football team brot its average up in the percentage column to .500, having won three games out of six played this season.

A hard rain the night before, and a heavy shower just before the game made the field slick and muddy. The local team made the only score in the game near the end of the second quarter, after smashing their way down the field 55 yards by a series of line plunges to a touchdown. Wells, Hillsboro full-back, carried the ball over and Shute kicked goal.

In the second half Hillsboro's goal was never in danger, while Gresham's was threatened nearly all of the time. The game was fairly fast and nearly free of the fumbles usually associated with a game on a muddy field with a slick ball.

Basketball practice commenced Monday, and judging from the large turnout, we should have a winning team this year. The first game of the season will be played here on Dec. 17, Beaverton being the opposing team.

HON. BRUCE HUSTON DIES IN COURT ROOM

Heart Attack, Due to Stomach Trouble, Ends Life

YEARS A HILLSBORO MAN

Fatal Attack Came While in Federal Court Room in Portland

Hon. S. B. Huston, better known as Bruce Huston, died from an attack of heart failure, Tuesday, Nov. 30, 1920, while in the Federal court room in Portland. He had just returned from luncheon and prior to calling of court was talking with the bailiffs, when he suddenly was stricken. The court room attendants gave him first aid, and called for a physician, but before medical aid reached him, Mr. Huston passed away. He had complained in the morning that he had suffered from stomach

trouble during the night, but was in the court room during the forenoon.

Mr. Huston was born in Salem, Indiana, March 16, 1858, the son of Oliver Huston and wife. The father was a soldier in the Union army, and lost his life at the battle of Stone River in 1862.

Early in life Mr. Huston taught school, and after three years in the Northern Indiana State Normal, he studied law at Robinson, Ill., and later at Salem, Indiana. He was admitted to the bar in 1879, and for four years after worked for the Santa Fe.

In 1883 he came to Oregon and worked near Forest Grove. In 1884 he settled in Hillsboro, and formed a partnership in law with the late T. B. Hanley.

He was successful in his law practice, particularly after he opened an office of his own. In 1892 he was elected to the State Senate from Washington County, and served one term. In the nineties he moved to Portland, and has practiced law in that city ever since. He has been a member of the Oregon Bar Ass'n., and has served Multnomah County, both in the House and the Senate, and was State Senator when he passed away.

His legal ability was unquestioned, and his range of reading was very wide.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Ella Geiger Huston, daughter of the late Dr. William Geiger, pioneer of 1839, and three children—Mrs. C. C. Clifford, of Baker; Oliver Huston, a practicing attorney of Portland, and Carl Huston, a salesman with a big exporting house. One child, Grover Gray, died in infancy.

Mr. Huston was a half-brother of Councilman A. M. Carlie, of Hillsboro.

The funeral took place Thursday from the Finley Parlors, and interment was in Riverview Cemetery.
