SOLDIERS AND SAILORS

The proposed measure to come before the legislature to give each Oregon war enlistment \$25 per month for each 30 days of service will be watched with interest. Inasmuch as Congress has utterly failed to take up the matter of compensation, it begins to look as though the states will, as a matter of justice, take up the matter as one of both local and just importance. Eleven states so far have made a provision to take care of this moot question. These boys served their country during a vicious war. Their enlistment pay was small, and their absence was the immediate cause of high wages at home. The slacker enjoyed those high wages with the others. Now that the boys are home there is no question but the law of averages demands they should be treated as citizens, not as chattels. The sentiment, wherever voted on, has shown tremendous majorities for an allowance, and the only bar in the way of legislative enactment will be "ways and means." The Argus sincerely hopes that some way can be engineered so that Oregon may, even tho an ungrateful government will not, do justice to those who offered their lives for their country.
