Chas. Elwell, one-time Portland mail carrier, and known in Hillsboro as the son-in-law of the late Thomas Tucker, was yesterday sentenced to one year in the county jail at Portland, and is to be restored to the government money as embezzled in the sum of \$2260.22. He is to have five days in which to put his personal affairs in order, and he then must begin serving his sentence. Elwell was the postmaster at Jennings Lodge, a suburb of Portland, close to the Clackamas County line. He kept the post office in a small store that he owned and conducted, and last winter the store was destroyed by fire. He was indicted by the grand jury of Clackamas County for the crime of arson, and was found guilty. He appealed this case and was then indicted by the U. S. grand jury. He first pleaded not guilty, but later withdrew the plea and admitted his guilt. Elwell's wife, formerly Miss Louisa Tucker, a musician of note in this county, was severely injured at the time of the fire, by jumping from the upper story. The fact that Elwell had stored his valuables in his barn prior to the fire, and the further fact that a Ouija board had warned him he was to have a fire—he was holding the board at the time—were factors in his being convicted of arson.

J. J. McNULTY LOSES HIS BIG DAMAGE SUIT

Jury out Forty Minutes and Votes
Verdict for Defendant

ASKED FOR 20,000 DOLLARS

Claimed Otto Hartrampf had
Alienated Wife's Affections

It took a jury forty minutes last night, after a three days' trial, to decide that J. J. McNulty had no case in his suit against Otto Hartrampf for alienation of wife's affection. McNulty alleged he had lived happily with his wife, and that she had left him because Hartrampf had interfered with his domestic happiness. He introduced letters addressed to plaintiff, written by the wife, full of affection and ending with love and kisses—this to sustain the allegation that she had affection for him—and then he says Hartrampf entered the scene and all was different. Mrs. McNulty testified that within two months after marriage she had left the husband, and that in the presence of Dick Sandford and wife, and her brother, she had a conference with him and told him that he had tricked her into marriage, and she, in company with those present at the time of the conference, swore that McNulty partially admitted he had tricked her and then agreed he would give her a divorce.

Later he changed his mind—evidently, and concluded he could make a piece of money out of the affair. Mrs. McNulty swore that McNulty, prior to their marriage, had asked her to go and visit his sister, at a room on Portland's East side. When they arrived the sister was not there, and she says McNulty left the room, ostensibly to get the sister. He soon returned and immediately afterward a policeman came and entered the room and told them to get married or he would take them to the police station. Mrs. McNulty swears that this was a trick on the husband's part to force a marriage, and she resented it, but rather than endure the notoriety of a police court went with him to Vancouver and was married.

She testified that two months later she left him, and the subsequent agreement for divorce was made. McNulty later changed his mind and then brought suit against Hartrampf for alienation. There was no evidence directly connecting Hartrampf with Mrs. McNulty in a criminal sense, and the case was not at all salacious. Attorney Smith, of Portland, was counsel for McNulty, and he was assisted by T. H. Tongue Jr. by courtesy.

Senator Wm. G. Hare, of Hare, McAlear & Peters, defended the suit.

Judge Kavanaugh, of Portland, heard the case. The jury: Z. T. Cole, J. B. Trullinger, C. W. Bloom, Harry L. Robinson, S. A. Walker, R. Hunziker, J. B. Buck, Jos. J. Ingram, L. L. Crawford, Jas. Churchill, J. W. Mulloy and H. P. Roberts.

Mrs. McNulty's maiden name was May Mead, and she was reared near Hillsboro. Her father is M. M. Mead, of above North Plains, and she is a niece of the late A. A. Mead, whom she nursed in his last illness.

Mrs. McNulty some time ago filed suit for divorce against McNulty. In the present case she admitted the affectionate letters written her husband, but testified that she feared him and wrote endearingly so he would not annoy her.

PRUNE BRANDY STILL TAKEN INTO CAMP

Fifteen-Gallon Still and 450 Gallons of Prune Mash

BERNARD HOLBOKE IN JAIL

A. F. Zillmer, Cedar Mill, Puts
up \$750 Cash Bail Yesterday

Bernard Holboke, of above Buxton, is in the county jail, and a still of fifteen gallons capacity was brought in from a place which Holboke leases from Walter Roswurm. A prune mash, measuring about 450 gallons, was found on the ranch. The arrest followed investigation by Virgil Weckert and Mr. Stockdale, who intercepted Holboke, who was driving a mule and a horse, at Buxton. It is supposed that he had delivered 15 gallons of moonshine to A. F. Zillmer, of near Cedar Mill, in whose machine was found liquor. J. C. Smith, of Forest Grove, arrested Zillmer, and officers Stockdale and Weckert, who had been watching Holboke, nabbed him when he drove through Buxton.

Holboke is in jail, without bonds as yet, while Zillmer put up \$750 cash bail. Zillmer says he bought the moonshine for a winter supply, and says he does not know the man personally who sold him the liquor.

Holboke formerly resided near Beaverton. As soon as Holboke was caught Weckert went on up to the Roswurm ranch and uncovered the illicit still and brought it in to Hillsboro.

B. B. Reves has been appointed by the Cedar Mill Grange to complete arrangements for the holding of four poultry demonstrations at the farm of Edward G. Clarke, at Cedar Mill, during the coming year. The first meeting will be at Mr. Clarke's poultry farm, December 29, starting at 9 a. m. and lasting until 11:30 a. m. This is a part of the plan of the Farm Bureau for four Poultry Demonstration Centers in the county for 1921. The other centers are at Hillaide, Shefflin and Sherwood.

Four demonstration meetings are planned for each center. The first will be the latter part of December and will deal generally with feeding of winter layers. The second of the series will be in February to discuss management of breeding flocks, incubation, etc. The third in time for handling of baby chicks and dealing with that topic. The last will be a culling demonstration to be held in June or about that time. H. E. Crosby, Poultry Demonstration Specialist, will take an active part in all these demonstrations.—County Agent.
