2. Seven dairymen will keep out account records on milk production.

The Congregational Sunday School will have a concert and Christmas tree at the church on Christmas eve—Friday night December 24, beginning at 7:30.

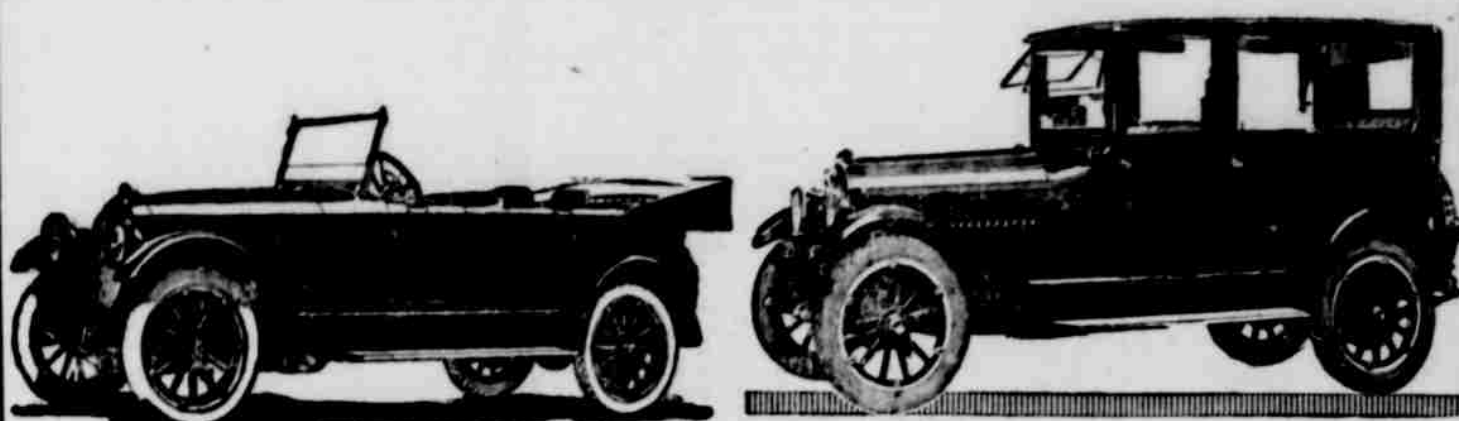
Among the numbers on the program is a cantata entitled, "Mrs. Santa and Her Christmas Dolls," given by the primary department. A short play, "A Christmas Tree Joke," by the "Bluebird" class. There will also be recitations and songs. The offering will be for foreign relief work.

Homer C. Atwell, of the State Board of Horticulture, was in the city the first of the week, meeting with Prof. Lovett, of O. A. C. Department of Entomology, who came here to inspect the strawberry situation as regards the weevil. Hillsboro and vicinity are the first district to be inspected, and Mr. Atwell says that California will allow strawberry plants to come into the state henceforth upon being accompanied by a certificate from the Oregon State Board that the plants were free from the parasite. Of course, this does not mean that California buyers are not to inspect them after arrival. Until this latter arrangement was made by our state board, Mr. Atwell says the express offices were not allowed to open packages.

Sheriff Alexander has Chas. Grimmett, formerly of Weiser, Idaho, in custody in the county jail, charged with the theft of an automobile from a Mr. Jackson, of near Scholls. Grimmett was caught in Portland. It is said the prisoner took the machine and sold it. His defense is that Jackson owed him for some repairs on the machine—something like fifty or sixty dollars. This Jackson does not deny, but the State of Oregon can't see that the debt in any way absolves Grimmett from the theft. Grimmett worked for L. W. Guild last Summer, and was thought to be straight.

Charles Elwell, of Portland, well known here, started his year's sentence to the county jail in Multnomah county, Monday. Elwell still has a two year sentence in the pen ahead of him in the state court from Oregon City, on conviction of arson. The Oregon City case has been appealed. Meantime he will serve his federal sentence for embezzlement.

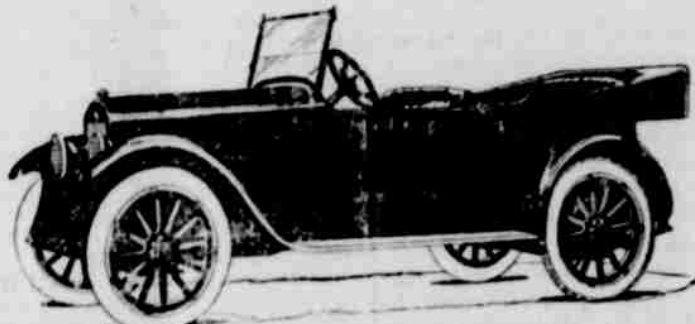

BOOST THE PRUNES

A traveller who discovered that Oregon prunes are not even featured in the menu of Oregon hotels, writes that if the luscious Italian prunes grown in Oregon are to be known at all they must be advertised.

As a result of advertising, he refers to the fact that prune lands in bearing in the Santa Clara Valley are selling for from \$1500 to \$2000 an acre, while about the same is asked for vineyards. The advertising of prunes and raising under brand names, and the assurance that crops will have a stable price, he says are responsible for these figures.

It is a fact that Oregon prunes are but little known in the East. But the Oregon Growers' Cooperative Association is now putting on an advertising campaign in New York City, introducing the Italian prunes under the brand name of "Mistland." This is the first time that the Oregon prunes have been advertised under a brand name. The association is planning later to advertise the "Mistland" products in Chicago and to eventually make "Mistland" and Oregon products known in every household in the country.
