ROBERT WEBB

Robert Webb died at his home a mile west of Hillsboro, south of Oak Park, December 16, 1920, aged 72 years, 11 months and 27 days. He was born near Canton, Ohio, Dec. 19, 1847, and when the father and two brothers went to the Civil War he was the sole support of his mother. The father died during the war, and the son provided for the mother during her lifetime. They moved to Kansas in 1873, and in 1874 Mr. Webb was united in marriage to Lydia A. Bateman. The family moved to Oregon in 1907 and settled near Hillsboro in 1908. He is survived by his widow and three children—Mrs. E. E. Mitchell, Portland; Mrs. Otto Johnson, of Hillsboro, R. 3, and H. E. Webb. The funeral took place Monday, interment being in the local cemetery.

Mr. Webb was highly esteemed by his neighbors, his honesty and integrity appealing to all who knew him.

LEAVES \$45,000

The last will and testament of the late John Algesheimer was filed in county court this week. J. W. Bailey and Ed. Schulerich were witnesses to the will, and the prayer sets up that the legacies amount to the probable sum of \$45,000. To his sister, Mary Elerson, and two brothers, Chris and George, and a nephew, Jos. Jones, he leaves \$4,000 each, and the residue of the estate goes to his brother, Conrad, who for many years has worked with and owned property in common with the testator. The will named T. H. Tongue Jr. as the attorney for the executor, and the instrument directs that Conrad Algesheimer shall act as executor.

The will of I. C. Clatter, of Mulloy, who died Dec. 2, 1920, was admitted to probate this week. The estate is valued at \$5650. He directs that the store building at Mulloy and the stock shall go to his granddaughter, Margaret Clatter, and she will be given the property, or the money from its sale, when she is aged 18. The executor is privileged to sell the store if he so elects, or run it until the grandchild becomes of age. To the two sons, Arnold and Herschell, he leaves \$1 each, and the residue of the estate goes to the widow.

KEEP YOUR HERDS

On account of the discouragements connected with the dairy business during the past few months, many dairymen have sold good herds of cows which represent several years effort in the building. These herds were not only sold but sacrificed.

When we look about and find that the grain and hay producing sections are not moving their crops, and the fruit growers are hit with low prices and slow movement of their product, it would seem that the dairymen have somewhat the better of the situation in that there is a market for milk and butterfat, even though not at an appreciable profit. Far-seeing men predict a change for the better in the near future. Again Washington County farmers must keep cows to insure the future production of their farms. To the People of Washington County

Do you remember the Food Administration? That made you eat chop feed and do without sugar, but shipped 120 million barrels of flour to the Allied nations and armies in seven months of 1917-18, when all the market statistics said there wasn't that much flour in the country?

Well, the Food Administration has come to life again for a few days, in Washington County—here's why:

You have been reading in the papers what Mr. Hoover says about children in Europe. He says that from Poland on the North to Slovakia on the South, there are over three million children in various degrees of hunger, from ordinary want to actual starvation, and that without help from America one million of them will be dead before April first—and Hoover knows.

Shut your eyes and try to imagine—to comprehend the awful thing.

Of course, we are not to blame. We didn't bring on the war. We have troubles of our own, etc. We're sick of drives and charity. Taxes are high and we've had to spend a lot of money for Christmas things.

These things are being said—oh, the shame of it! When in Washington County we do not know the real meaning of want.

If we could see a procession of a paltry hundred of these starvelings in our streets, every table would have a place for one of them, because then we could, seeing, realize the pity and agony of it.

Europe cannot feed them. America must, or they die.

Oregon's proportion is \$250,000, and Washington County's \$6000, about thirty cents per person, or an average of a dollar a family. Can we stand it? How can a person sit down to a big Christmas dinner and forget these poor kids to whom a bowl of soup would be a sup of heaven?

Anyway, the State Committee have been having trouble to get Washington County organized to do its share. They have finally appealed to our old organization. We can't turn it down. We're willing to take the chance of failure at this late day, believing that the people who were loyal during the war, have Christmas, human hearts today, and will not see us fail in such a matter as this, when the amount is so little.

We need your help. The Order of the Eastern Star of Hillsboro have tendered their support and named a committee consisting of Mrs. R. F. Peters, Mrs. E. L. Moore, Mrs. C. E. Wells and Rev. H. A. Deck, for this city.

May we not have the help of every fraternal body in the county, as well as every merchant and district chairman who so loyally co-operated with us during the war, to meet this call of suffering children, that the people of Washington County be not ashamed.
