**ANNUAL MEETING**

The Farm Bureau held its annual meeting January 3rd. The program adopted for 1921:

**Livestock**—To list all pure bred sires, grades and scrubs in the community. Banks community hopes that within the near future that all sires will be pure bred. There are many excellent pure breeds in that community, outgrowing herds, that should be transferred to other communities instead of being slaughtered when the owner is through with them. It is hoped to assist in the transfer of such animals. One Standard Livestock Club is to be organized. Their members have already been pledged and two more needed. It is the aim to have this club exhibit at the Banks Hog and Dairy Show. The Washington County Bank has already taken steps toward the organizing of a Pig Club in that community. This latter club has about a dozen members. It was decided to issue a livestock marketing circular once each month or six weeks.

**Rodents**—Ira N. Gabrielson, of the U. S. Biological Survey, was present and explained that the Biological Survey would place a man in that locality to experiment with the poisoning of gophers, provided the community would systematically poison a given area of land, say 2000 acres in case a poison is found that will successfully get the gophers. Mr. Gabrielson explained at the meeting that there had been recently developed a form of tasteless strychnine which they expect to use in their experiments. Mr. Gabrielson's plan was accepted with considerable enthusiasm.

**Poultry**—To hold one poultry culling demonstration.

**Horticulture**—To hold one pruning demonstration of two days' duration.

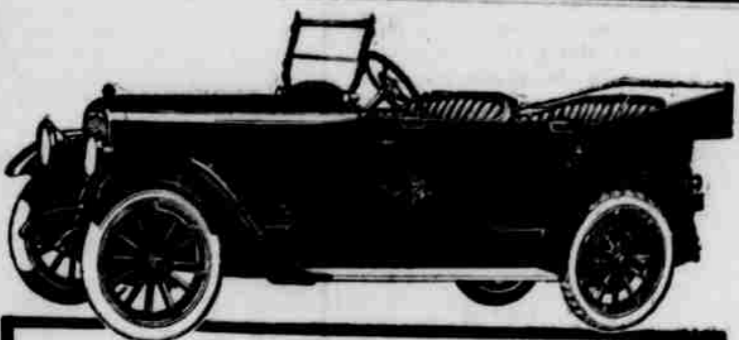
