

HEAVY RAINS WITH SNOW IN THE HILLS

Greatest Storm and Rainfall
Since Winter of 1894-5

FIVE INCHES EXCESS RAIN

Since Last September. Lower
Temperatures Prevailing

The past week saw one of the heaviest rainfalls of the winter season since the winter of 1894-5, and the bureau at Portland registers an excess of rainfall since last September of 5.38 inches—and just how much the basin "sloped over" isn't recorded. The Willamette River flooded the Portland lower town basements, and every stream in Western Oregon has been running bank full.

Snow fell in the Coast Range and logging was suspended in the mountains all along the Tillamook line.

Yesterday the weather stiffened up a little and there was a slight flurry of snow here, but it melted as fast as it fell.

By this morning the temperature had lowered so much that an overcoat was useful, but there was no ice formed.

Country roads are in bad shape as many culverts and low crossings have been washed out.

When you are inclined to kick just think how much nicer it has been than a snowfall.

MAYOR SHUTE TAKES HOLD OF CITY REINS

Sends in Message to Council at
Tuesday Night Session

NAMES YEAR COMMITTEES

Asks Support of Citizenship to
Make Hillsboro Better Town

Mayor A. C. Shute and the new council were sworn in Tuesday night at the City Hall, and the new executive then read his message to the council, which, incidentally, is also a message to the people of the municipality.

Appointments—
Mayor Shute announced the following appointments: Grant Zarnwalt, street commissioner; Carl Larsen, chief of police; Benton Bowman, city attorney; S. O. Levaak, city engineer; Dr. J. O. Robb, health officer; Walter Tews, night officer.

Library Board, to serve four years each—John H. Garrett, M. H. Stevenson, E. C. Luce and Mrs. C. W. Rollins.

Committees—Finance, Garrett, Welch, Phelps; Street, Trullinger, Phelps and Vaughn; water and light, Vaughn, Carlile and Welch; sanitary, Welch, Carlile and Trullinger; civic improvement, Carlile, Garrett and Vaughn; park, Phelps, Trullinger and Garrett.

Mayor's Message—
To the Members of the City Council of the City of Hillsboro—

We are together commissioned to govern and protect the municipality of Hillsboro. I take no pleasure in playing the part assigned to me. I view it as a civic duty to be performed without reward or praise. I have no desire to be mayor of Hillsboro, and I yielded my consent only after it seemed to me that refusal was no longer consonant with my duties as a citizen. I have no high sounding promises to make. Conscientious service should be our watchword. I approach the performance of my duties humbly and with full realization of the responsibility imposed and the embarrassment which will result. Past mayors and councils have made mistakes—serious mistakes. We will make mistakes. And my recommendations, while I desire to speak plainly, I desire my message viewed as intended helpful criticism, and not censure for past mistakes.

My familiarity with the needs and requirements of our city results solely from an interest taken as an ordinary citizen. I do not possess an insight into the internal affairs of the city, as disclosed by its records, to the extent which the performance of my duties will soon make necessary. I, therefore, must content myself with a few blunt suggestions, and point out certain avenues of investigation which we should follow together.

Controversy with the North Coast Power Company—
One of the most serious problems confronting our municipality is the litigation between the City and Power Company. This litigation has been decided adversely to the contention of the city, both by the circuit and supreme courts of this state. A considerable cost in litigation has been sustained by the city, all of which now appears to have been spent without success. The desire of the preceding administration to protect the city from the payment of approximately \$50,000.00 in hydrant rentals during the life of the company's franchise, was laudable. But however great the moral right of the city to insist upon the hydrant rental clause of the franchise, from a legal standpoint, the city was hopelessly barred from insisting upon free fire protection.

Popular condemnation of the attitude of the Power Company in going back upon the plain letter of its contract with the city, cannot be too severe; but nevertheless, from a legal standpoint, the city has apparently been chasing rainbows. It is my belief that the company is derelict in performing other obligations imposed upon it by its franchise, of which the court will take cognizance, and the city should hold the company to the strictest accountability. The company undertakes to furnish the city with "ample supply of good, pure and wholesome water, in such quantities and at such times as may be required for lawn irrigation, domestic, fire, sewerage, manufacturing and other purposes." It is a well known fact that following each freshet, our water is highly colored and filled with debris. Furthermore, during the summer months, the residents of our city are restricted to the use of water for lawn purposes, while the company which undertakes to furnish us, conveys water through our municipality for sale to customers at Reedville and Beaverton and intervening points. It would also appear questionable to me as to whether or not the company has maintained the pressure stipulated by the franchise for fire protection. This matter should be definitely ascertained. Again, whenever the company tears up or undermines pavement in connection with repair of water mains, the same should be promptly repaired, and not permitted to remain in a dangerous condition awaiting the company's pleasure.

The theory of the Public Utility Act is that service shall be furnished by the company at actual cost thereof, plus a reasonable profit. If the rates charged to the patrons of Hillsboro were, prior to the recent litigation, sufficient to pay the cost of service and return a fair profit, then the fact that the city is called upon to pay by way of hydrant rental, a sum of money not contemplated by the franchise, should be reflected in the rates charged to the consumers, and automatically the rates to consumers within the city should be decreased to an amount equal to hydrant rentals paid by the city. Furthermore, I am not advised whether the rates charged the consumers within the City of Hillsboro by the Company are based

upon the cost of service rendered by the company in all localities served by it, plus a fair return upon the capital invested by the company in all such localities. This matter should be ascertained. Hillsboro should stand a unit, and should not bear the burden of any other locality, nor ask any other community to bear its burden. I would suggest that the question of rates charged the consumers by the company for both water and light service be investigated, and if the charge made to the residents of Hillsboro be not based upon the investment of the company in serving Hillsboro, that appropriate legislation be encouraged to enable the city to be considered a unit in determining water and light rates. I have been advised that the company has an exceptionally favorable contract with the concern from which it obtains its power for lights, and we should see to it that under the same Public Utility Act the aid of which the company has invoked to require the city to pay hydrant rentals which the company agreed to give to the city without cost, full protection of the city's rights will be secured.

I am not a believer in municipal ownership, but unless the city be treated honestly and fairly by the company, it should avail itself of its water rights on Dairy Creek which will not expire until 1924, amend the charter so as to possess the right to bond for the construction of a water system, and fully prepare to defend itself against the company which, through defective construction, seemingly permits more water to waste through its drains, than it permits its consumers to use on its lawns.

Retirement of City Bonds—
I am advised, but I do not speak positively, that when bonds for the first public improvements of our city become due on the first of July, 1921, funds will not be available to meet the liability. If true, this is a most serious question. The city records are not in a satisfactory condition, and we should make it our business to ascertain at once, the true state of the city's fiscal affairs.

Civic Improvement—
Hillsboro is no longer a crossroads village. It has earned and is entitled to be considered the best town of its size in the State of Oregon. The lively stable and the old court house building upon Main street are eyesores and disgraces to the city. If an appropriate and satisfactory legal remedy cannot be found, then a united public opinion should attempt to awaken the owners to a sense of civic responsibility. Stringent parking ordinances should be passed, and should be enforced without fear or favor, and irrespective of the standing or influence of the property owner. A well ordered and properly kept town will be reflected in increased valuations.

Engineering Department—
Engineering mistakes are apparent throughout the city. Following each heavy rainfall, our paved streets are, in many places, covered with standing water. During the past six months, I am informed that over \$5,500 has been expended in services of engineers. I assume that all payments are regular, but I would suggest that hereafter all such claims be presented in due form, properly segregated and carefully audited.

Speed Limit and Signs—
It has been my observation that the smaller the town, the lower the speed limit. There is no reason why Hillsboro should have a lower speed limit than Portland. I would therefore suggest that the speed limit from the easterly city limits to Tenth and Baseline streets, and from the westerly city limits to North Range street, be raised from 15 to 25 miles per hour, except upon intersections, and that on other parts of the city, the speed limit be raised to 30 miles per hour. Suitable signs indicating the speed limit should be installed. The sign now on Main street, notifying motorists to refrain from passing cars, is so arranged that it cannot be found without a spy-glass. Such a sign does no good. In this connection permit me to also suggest that the road through and out of the main part of the city be designated by lettering telephone poles. By a reasonable speed limit and appropriate signs, a better impression will be made upon visiting tourists, and fewer people will unwittingly violate the law.

City Records—
Proper facilities and equipment for handling the city records should be immediately purchased. Not only will our officers be better able to serve the people, but a great saving will result to the city itself.

Night Watchman—
The merchants of the city are entitled to the protection of a night watchman at the expense of the city. They should not be required to make contributions toward his salary. The officer serves for the protection of the entire city, and should be paid by the city. Because of the recent crime wave in Portland, I believe it would be advisable for two night watchmen to be placed on duty for at least a portion of the year. A few nights ago a bitter fight occurred in the streets of the city, unmolested by any peace officer.

Reports—
The council should insist upon proper reports, pursuant to the terms of the charter, being made by all officers promptly at the time required. This suggestion is not intended to reflect upon the integrity of said public officials, but the fiscal affairs of the city should be constantly be made known and kept before the council and also the taxpayers of the city.

Interest on City Deposits—
The state obtains interest from the banks upon state funds; the county obtains interest from the banks upon county funds; the City of Portland obtains interest from the banks upon its funds; and the City of Hillsboro should receive interest upon the monthly balances of the city on deposits. No city funds should lie idle without returning some income to the city.

Classification of Duties of Recorder and Treasurer—
The charter should be clarified as to the duties of Recorder and Treasurer. All city records should be kept in the office of the Recorder, who should be the collector of the city funds. The work of these offices has increased in magnitude. The salaries are not adequate. I would therefore recommend that early attention be given to placing these officers upon proper salaries.

Commission Form of Government—
With your co-operation, it shall be my purpose to appoint a committee of leading citizens of the community to make a study of a commission form of municipal government. I believe that our city government could be simplified and reduced to a business basis through a city manager, responsible to a small commission. The government of the City of Hillsboro should be conducted as efficiently as

that of a private corporation and up-to-date business methods should prevail.

City Park—
The present park tangle must be untangled. We must investigate this matter together, and effect an early solution, so that the park improvement will not be longer delayed.

Co-operation of Citizens—
The citizens of Hillsboro should realize that we are devoting our time and best efforts without compensation. Censure will be our only reward. It shall be my purpose to invite leading citizens of our community to meet with us and to assist in solving our problems, which are in fact their problems as well as ours. The civic conscience of Hillsboro is awakened, and it is my firm belief that we will have the co-operation and assistance of all citizens interested in a greater and better Hillsboro.

Conclusion—
My survey of the duties incumbent upon us has necessarily been limited. I expect with you to acquaint myself with the actual conditions confronting the city, and I hope we will be able to properly solve the city's problems. The observations of this message, while terse and blunt, are not intended in any respect as personal, nor has my criticism been intended to be harsh. It is with a profound feeling that Hillsboro is today confronting with at least two of the most serious problems which have arisen during its corporate existence, that I join with you in attempting their solution. I trust that our efforts may prove of benefit to our city.
