**HARE IS BUSY**

Senator Hare has introduced a measure inclined to curtail the Portland automobile mechanic grafting, and also a measure providing for a short form deed and mortgage. He has cut from the form submitted all of the old common law rubbish and if the measure shall pass, the costs of recording will be cut in two and work at the recorder's office considerably lessened. This measure is in effect in practically all progressive states of the Union, and it is one which should have been adopted in Oregon a long time ago. He has also introduced a measure with respect to the 60 days legislative session, eliminating the introduction of bills after the first 40 days, thereby preventing consideration of the midnight resolutions and eleventh hour measures.

The question of a state bonus for ex-service men is engaging the attention of the legislature at this time, and the American Legion post throughout Oregon are busy determining the sentiment of the men in reference to the question. A referendum has been ordered by the Department Executive Committee as a manner of determining the action to be taken by the legislative committee. Adjutant Olson, of the local post, yesterday received a telegram from the department adjutant ordering Hillsboro Post into special meeting to take up the question. Commander Morgan has issued the call for a short but spirited meeting to be held Saturday evening, Jan. 15, 7:30, in Legion Hall. A representative group of Legionnaires is desired in order that a full discussion may be held. It is understood that sentiment strongly favors the bonus plan, and Hillsboro Post has informally endorsed it, but on account of certain opposition which has developed in the state the matter has been referred again to the post in order that the full facts may be made known.
