WALTER J. HAYNES

Walter Judson Haynes died at his home at Helena, Mont., Jan. 13, 1921. He was born at Pleasantville, Marion Co., Iowa, May 20, 1869, the son of Mr. and Mrs. James M. Haynes. They moved from Iowa to South Dakota in 1883 and young Haynes commenced teaching school at the age of 19, earning money to put him through the American school of telegraphy. After graduation, he accepted his first railway employment as agent's helper, and followed the business for 25 years. He held responsible positions on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul and the N. P. R. R., and in 1913 resigned as agent at Helena to become the secretary of the State Railway Commission with offices at Helena, which position he held at time of death. Mr. Haynes was united in marriage to Lida B. Foster, at Grand View, South Dakota, May 3, 1891,

the widow and six children surviving him.

He leaves the following brothers and sisters:

Chas. S. and Miles J. Haynes, Sherwood, Ore.; Carey Scott Haynes, Walla Walla Wn.; Anna M. Laurence, Fresno, Cal.; Elsie G. Auld, Portland. He was a member of the Elks, Modern Woodmen and A. O. U. W. lodges.

NEW ROAD BILL

A bill providing for permanent highway construction in all counties annually has been introduced in the house by Representative Earl E. Fisher. It creates the Greater Oregon Highway system, under supervision of the state highway commissioner and state highway engineer.

Provision is made that, beginning with the year 1922 and each year thereafter, all state highway funds for building new highways shall be divided on a 50-50 basis, one-half of such funds to be used annually for constructing of trunk lines and main highways through the state and the other half to be divided equally among several counties, to be spent annually with other roads funds such as each county may levy for the construction of roads in each county under the full supervision of the state highway commission and the state highway engineer.

The county court in January of each year shall designate the roads on which such funds shall be used and "the work shall be planned as a whole to the end that all permanent highway construction in Oregon, both state and county, will be gradually merged into one uniform system of state highways."

GUERNSEY CLUB

The Washington County Guernsey Cattle Club met in Hillsboro, January 15. Mr. Goodin, being unable to attend, sent an invitation from the Oregon Guernsey Cattle Club to the County Club to attend the Guernsey Jubilee in Clatsop County next June.

After some discussion of advertising and exhibiting at the fall fairs, it was decided to join with the Holstein and Jersey breeders of Washington County in exhibiting a county herd. The chairman named a committee of three—Mr. Goodin, Mr. Hesse and Mr. Batchelor, to choose the exhibit, it being understood that outside help can be secured in making selections.
