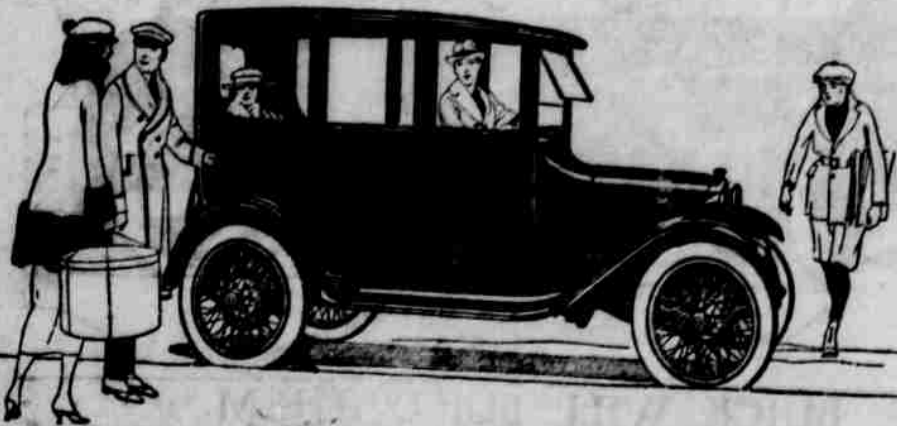

CANNERY INDUSTRY

The Northwest Canneries Association, which is not a trust but organized to standardize the pack, represents an investment in Oregon, Washington and Idaho of \$5,000,000 to \$5,000,000.

The pack in 1919 was 2,500,000 cases of fruits and vegetables, and in 1920 it was two million cases. If prices readjustment can be met to increase consumption the pack will be normal in 1921.

One of the hangovers of government operations of railroads is the loss of consolidation rates, under which a carload could be sent east made up of an assortment of canned fruits, vegetables and fish.

From California the volume of carload shipments east exceeds the number of carloads shipped into the state, while in the Northwest the opposite condition prevails—more carloads coming west.

An effort is to be made before the interstate Commerce Commission to restore consolidation rates, so that salmon and other canned goods can go east in carload lots.

BEE FOOD FORMULA

H. A. Sullen, Oregon Agricultural college bee expert, gives a good substitute for the natural food of bee colonies, which need supplementary feeding at this time of the year. Following is the formula for preparing the food: Six pounds of granulated sugar, 3/4 pound liquid glucose, 2 1/2 cups water (20 oz.), 1/4 teaspoon of cream tartar.

The sugar, water and glucose should be mixed together and stirred until ready to boil. The cream of tartar is then added and the stirring stopped while the mixture comes to a good boil. It is very important not to scorch the sugar, since scorched sugar kills bee in the winter time. When the mixture is thoroughly cooled and beaten it should be poured into an empty wire frame with a close fitting board nailed to one side and placed in the hive next to the cluster of bees.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS

Notice is hereby given that on Monday, February 14, 1921, the tax rolls for the year 1920 will be open for collection of taxes, and the first half of all taxes shall be paid on or before April 5 following, and the second half on or before October 5 following. Interest shall be charged and collected at the rate of one per cent per month or fraction of a month in case of delinquency, until paid. Interest at said rate applies to the first half if not paid by April 5, and to the second half if not paid by October 5. All taxes remaining unpaid on October 5, 1921, a penalty of 5 per cent, will be charged and collected thereon in addition to the interest herein provided.

Any day after the expiration of six months after the taxes charged against real property are delinquent, the sheriff shall have the right, and it shall be his duty upon demand to make out and issue certificates of delinquency against such property, such certificates to bear interest at the rate of 12 per cent.
