MRS. L. I. DAVIS

Mrs. Lewis I. Davis, of South Hillsboro, died at the Good Samaritan Hospital, in Portland, March 26, 1921. Her maiden name was Annie Fenner, and she was born in Kansas, Nov. 16, 1870, her parents being David and Sarah Fenner. Her father died Sept. 25, 1907, and her mother passed away Oct. 11, following.

The Fenners moved to Polk City, Iowa, when Mrs. Davis was a small child. She was married to Mr. Davis at Polk City, Iowa, December 21, 1887. They lived at Polk City until 1904, when they came West and settled at Dayton, Wash., where they lived until 1909, when they moved to Gaston, Ore. In 1910 they moved to Hillsboro and have lived here since. Three children were born to the union, Robert Ray, who lives on a farm near Prineville, and where for some time he was an instructor in the Crook County union high school; Cecil Fay, a daughter, who died at the age of three years, and Edith May, wife of Earl Simpson, now residing at home, Hillsboro. The surviving husband is well known here in Hillsboro.

The funeral took place Tuesday from the Limber Parlors and the services were conducted by Rev. Carrick. Interment was in the Odd Fellows' cemetery, the Royal Neighbors conducting the rites at the grave. She was a member of that order, and was also a member of the Christian church.

Of her immediate family she is survived by the following brothers and sister—John, Fred and Ernest Fenner and Mrs. Carrie Caldwell, of Des Moines, Iowa, and Bruce Fenner, of Polk City, that state.
