The sheriff's office reports that on Tuesday night the cash collected on the tax roll amounted to \$372,782.16, as against the sum of \$327,326.37 for the corresponding period a year ago. Monday of this week was the largest day in the history of the county, 496 receipts having been written up. There is yet several thousand dollars in mail payments to add to the above collection. This year's payments at the time of delinquency approach were 5972 receipts as against

5876 last year. Notwithstanding the cry of hard time it will be seen that the cash payments exceeded those of a year ago nearly fifty thousand dollars.

Some crooks bored a hole in the door of the old store building at the Hawthorne place the other night at midnight, and inserted a rubber hose thro the hole, and proceeded to try to gas the occupant, Mr. Constable. The fumes strangled him and he awakened about 12:15 and made a rush for the door. The perpetrators fled. Formaldehyde was the principal ingredient used to make the gas. Robbery is supposed to have been the motive. Deputy Downs went out and said that even after he arrived the fumes were nearly unbearable.

Burglars visited Banks the other night and looted the Banks Mercantile and Schroll's Garage. From the store they took 4 cartons of Velvet tobacco, containing 144 boxes; 4 butts of chewing, and a lot of Chancellor cigars. From the garage they took 4 casings, 4 inner tubes and 8 or 10 spark plugs. The articles were all found near the Gales Creek Railway stop near the Dooley place, placed under a plank. They must have been placed there about one o'clock yesterday as they were not there prior that time, the place being where freight is loaded and unloaded.

Chief Larsen caught a Portland policeman speeding on the highway inside the city limits the other day and took him before Recorder McCormick, who assessed the violator ten bucks. He showed his badge to the Chief when caught, but it did him no good. He threatened to "get" Larsen when he visited Portland, but the chief isn't losing any sleep. The Chief says he plays no favorites.

C. J. Tohlen, of Progress, reports that his house was entered the other day and burglars carried away a dark striped suit, 2 brown overcoats, a lady's brown jacket, a lady's gray jacket, a pearl necklace, valuable, a gold chain, diamond and pearl set, \$35 in cash, a rifle and a genuine leather traveling bag. Sheriff Alexander is trying to locate the loot in the second hand stores of Portland.

The house of Chas. E. Nelson, of Cooper Mountain, was burglarized a few days ago when the family was absent. The thieves carried away a silk umbrella, 3 new shirt waists, 3 bath towels, a suit case, a camera and several other articles. Two strange young men were seen in the vicinity about the time of the robbery.

Sheriff Alexander Saturday landed Oscar Jensen, formerly of Scholls, in the county jail, bringing him from Seattle. He raised a check on the Hillsboro National from \$18.66 to \$80.66. The check was given him by L. W. Guild, and the young man proceeded to raise it and realize on it. He will answer to the grand jury.
