RAY J. DeBUHR

Full military honors will be rendered at the funeral of Ray J. DeBuhr, Portland boy, who was drowned while swimming at Olongapo, P. I. The services will be conducted by the Rev. W. A. Gueffroy, of Tigard, under the auspices of the marine corps and Portland post of the American Legion, Saturday afternoon, at 1 o'clock. Members of the recruiting party of the Portland office and of the Legion will bear the body to the grave in Rose City cemetery, where the firing squad will give the last salute and taps will be blown.

Ray DeBuhr, the son of R. J. DeBuhr, of Canby, was born in Portland in 1900. He attended Thompson school and on graduation enlisted in the army in 1918. Serving but a few months, he was discharged shortly after the armistice. He enlisted in the marine corps May 26, 1920, through the Portland office.

Sent to Mare Island for training, he was ordered to Cavite, P. I., for duty and February 9, 1921, was sent to Olongapo. He had been on the station 10 days before he was drowned. The body arrived here today.

DeBuhr is survived by his father and mother, four brothers and five sisters. The DeBuhr family formerly resided near North Plains.

Schomburg was in the dairy business at Tillamook and also in this county, several years, and he was one of the first to realize Washington County's possibilities as a dairy district. In company with Geo. R. Bagley, present circuit judge, and Dr. J. P. Tamiess, Schomburg talked condenser, and the three put up the initial factory, first at North Plains and later at Hillsboro. Fred is a thorough dairyman and knows his business. When he first came to this county, Tillamookers laughed at the prospects, but Fred lived to see the day that Washington County led every county in the state in dairy production.

ECLIPSE OF MOON

The moon will undergo a total eclipse tonight. The shadow of the earth will start across the face of old Luna at 8:57 o'clock and the eclipse will go to totality at 11:23, and so remain until 12:05. The big arc will start to emerge at that time and will be free of shadow by 2:32.

The eclipse will be the only one visible on the coast this year. Forest Grove students will leave P. U. for Gales Peak early this evening, in order to witness the phenomenon at a high altitude.
