ANNUAL SCHOOL DAY

The first annual School Day of Washington County will be held at Forest Grove, Saturday, May 14. Both grammar and high schools from all parts of the county will meet in competitive events, including public speaking, as well as drama and track athletics. Some form of award is to be given to the winner in each event; and it is anticipated there will be a mammoth attendance.

The program for the day will include a grade school declamation contest and the final tryout of the tennis tournament in the morning; a track meet for both grammar and high schools in the afternoon, and the high school declamatory contest for the evening. The county has been divided into 5 sections and preliminary tryouts have been held in each section. The students of the four-year high schools will compete against each other while those of high schools of less than four years will be in a class by themselves. The grade school athletes are to be divided by having separate events for those under 12 years of age.

The committee at its Tuesday night meeting decided upon a very small admission fee. A ticket good for all events will cost only 25 cents and a small admission will be charged for children at the declamation contests. It is hoped in this way to secure a larger attendance and arouse the greatest possible interest in the School Day. The meet will be held under the direction of Pacific University.

At the recent annual meeting of the Washington County Farm Bureau a committee of wheat growers introduced a resolution asking that wheat marketing be made a major project of the Farm Bureau. Accordingly field men for the Oregon Co-operative Grain Growers' Association are now in the county to discuss with grain growers the methods which are being employed by this co-operative concern for the purpose of marketing wheat.

The Northwest Grain Growers' Association of which the Oregon unit is a part have 27,000,000 bushels of wheat signed up at this time. An active campaign has been started just recently in Oregon, and already over 3,000,000 bushels have been pledged.

One of the first meetings held will be at the Grange Hall at Scholls at 8:00 p. m., Friday, the 6th of May. M. R. Hoff is committee man in that district.

Other meetings will be announced later, and will be addressed by Edgar L. Ludwick, State Organization Director, and Bert L. Blood and H. T. Miller, field men of this organization.
