BIG SUIT FILED

Mrs. Alice M. Hammer, of this city, has filed a suit against the estate of the late William McQuillan, asking for the McQuillan home at Second and Oak Sts., valued at about \$4,800, and \$2,000 in cash. Mrs. Hammer makes C. W. Redmond, executor of the last will of Mr. McQuillan, and all the McQuillan legatees defendants, and she asks for an injunction prohibiting Executor Redmond from bringing proceedings to oust her from the premises until the circuit court passes upon her suit.

The complaint alleges that in May, 1919, she was living in the McQuillan home and that the testator was feeble in health. She says he agreed with her that if she would give him food and lodging and her personal care in nursing as long as he lived he would will her the 95x110 occupied by the McQuillan home and give her a legacy of \$2,000 in cash. She says that she thereupon refused to take other work, nursing, and applied her time to the contract. She admits that the contract was not in writing, but that unless the court decrees her the land and money, she will be out and injured on a bona fide agreement between herself and the testator.

According to her complaint she lived up to the alleged contract from May, 1919, until November 3, 1920. She says that the executor has refused to pay her the \$2,000 in cash, although it has been demanded.

Mr. Redmond states that the case will be fought in the courts, and has retained Hare, McAlear & Peters to defend the action.

Arthur D. Moulton, of Portland, and Bump & Bump, of Hillsboro, are attorneys for Mrs. Hammer.

SHORT CROP EAST

Reports from the various fruit centers in the middle west and eastern states all indicate a greater damage to fruits than was at first reported, according to private advices received by the Oregon Growers' Cooperative Association.

An authority on general fruit matters in the central states writes: "Everything we have been able to learn regarding the fruit situation between the Rocky mountains and the Atlantic coast indicates the lightest crop in a generation. Since I last wrote you, there has been considerable damage to our prospects. Commercially speaking, the Missouri

crop is limited to blackberries, strawberries and apples. The apple crop will be about a quarter of that a year ago."

From Idaho comes recent reports to the Association of serious loss to cherries, apricots and peaches and from the Yakima valley damage to cherries and peaches. In general it may be said that the east will have one of the smallest fruit crops in years.—Oregon Growers' Ass'n.
