ONION SMUT

H. P. Bars, Plant Pathologist, of Oregon Agricultural Experiment Station, makes the following report to the Washington County Farm Bureau through J. C. Leedy, who is representing the onion growers in the Farm Bureau.

"I was met by Mr. Leedy. We talked over the plans and decided to proceed at once to get the formaldehyde drip tank made. This required a long hunt in Beaverton and then Portland for necessary materials, but the tank was finally finished.

Mr. Leedy kindly devoted his time and his automobile to this work, and entertained me at his home over night, which I greatly appreciated.

The first day we visited the Fanno onion field and met Mr. F. Erikson, in charge of the work there. He agreed to aid in the investigation, being equipped with formaldehyde drip tanks already.

The second day the new tank was fitted up to the drill and the test plots were seeded on the Leedy place, using the formaldehyde method. A dust method will be tested also by Mr. Leedy under the instruction of the Experiment Station, as I did not have the materials with me at the time.

I believe the Farm Bureau Onion Growers' Committee and the onion growers of the county will find the demonstrations of great value. Certainly onion smut is a parasite so persistent and so dangerous that onion men cannot afford to let it increase any longer, without definite attempts to control it. In about 6 or 8 weeks I expect to check up on results for the first time." County Agent.
