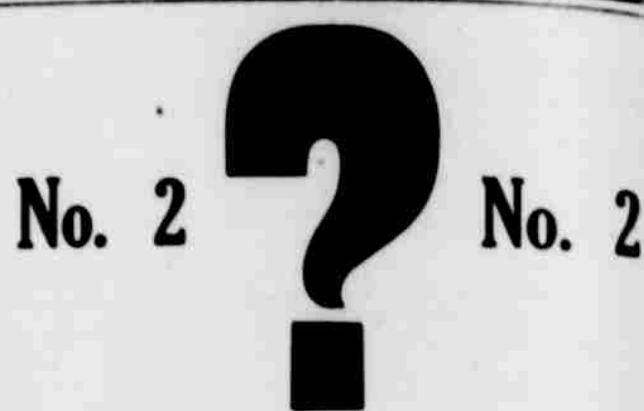
R. L. Robinson, of Farmington was in town this morning and witnessed the Jersey Club start on its tour of the county.

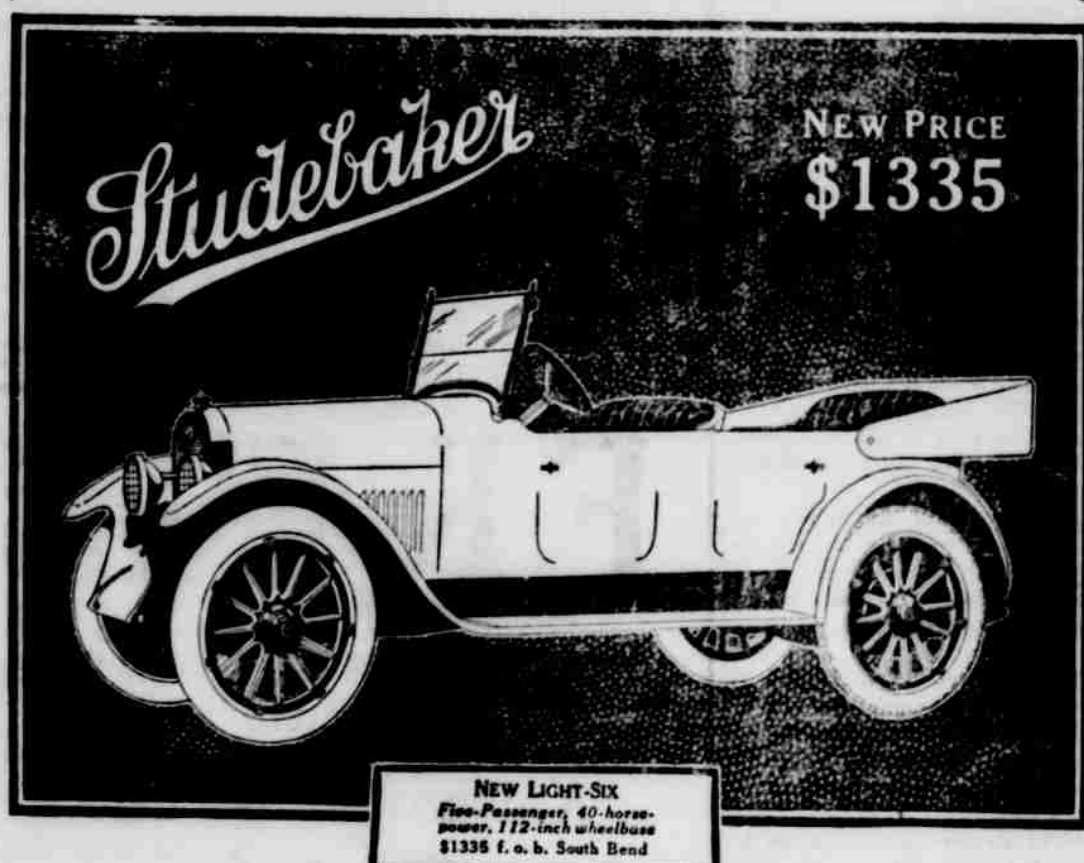
