O. A. C. WRITER TALKS

Twenty-five pounds of butter fat for one ton of hay is reported by some dairy farmers, while fifty or even seventy-five pounds are obtained for each ton fed to high producers," explained C. J. McIntosh, agricultural writer for the O. A. C. experiment station, who was in Hillsboro Monday.

"It is one aim of cow-testing associations to lower production costs by cutting out the twenty-five pound types.

"Some association members go so far as to say they make money by swapping two or more low producers for one high yielder."

"It's not a question of increasing production, but lowering costs and saving a surplus hay for some other purpose."

"To feed the good hay equally to the good and bad cows was said to be much like handing it to market where one dealer pays \$10.00 per ton and another \$20.00, and not knowing which is which, divide the sale between the two.

"The cow testing association will disclose the \$10 man and enable the grower to sell to the best market.

"The effect of bull association in questioning the herds at a high producing level at a low cost has justified these associations in many places, and may be expected to help greatly in Washington County.

Some lines of work now in progress of development that give promise of a good deal of value, are potato certification; onion maggot control; testing cows for tuberculosis, and children's club work.

Already 22 growers have made applications for potato certification, and whether all get by with it or not, they are bound to have a great improvement in yield and quality of their crop. In an adjoining county, out of 56 applicants for certification, two succeeded. The County Agent made up a car lot of those that were not accepted and sent them to the California market for seed. This was last year and the California growers say that this was the best car lot of seed potatoes they had ever had, because the disease which prevented certification here does not seem to develop under California conditions.

Certification of seeds in general has been found in many districts to prove of great value in yielding quality and market value crops.

In addition to the many clubs now at work in Washington county a new calf club at Scholls is reported by the County Agent. Opportunities for judging will be given the members who expect to enter contests at the State Fair and Portland Livestock Show."
