The undersigned was by the county court of Washington County, Oregon, on the 20th day of July, 1921, duly appointed administrator of the estate of Maggie Neep, deceased.

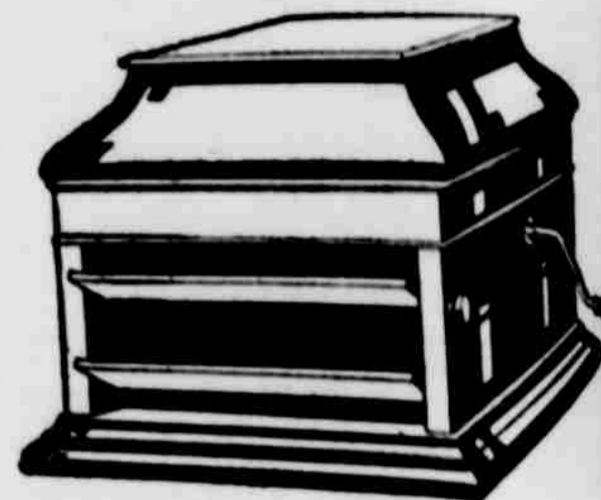
