Each time that a Hillsboro service man's remains are brot to the old home for burial it is a reminder of the great and sacrificial price of war. It would appear that statesmen who sidestep great humanitarian efforts to stop the ravages of warfare should realize that the desolation of homes is the price that every effort should be made to cancel.

Henry Albers, aged 55 years, died at his home in Portland, yesterday. Albers came before the public when he was convicted of violating the espionage act. The U. S. attorney general dismissed the case which was on appeal and retrial had been ordered. Albers suffered a stroke of paralysis some time ago. Albers was a citizen of the United State, having taken out his papers twenty years ago. His defense was that he was intoxicated when he uttered statements against the government during war time.

Wm. McDonald, formerly of Yakima, was arrested and convicted of drunkenness at Forest Grove the other day and Judge W. J. R. Beach fined him \$50 and \$4 costs. In default of payment he was sent down to the county jail to serve 27 days. Yakima officers have telegraphed that he is wanted up there to answer a charge of larceny and he will probably be turned over to the sheriff of that place.

Geo. E. Miller, aged about 7 years, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank W. Miller, of Lane Co., was drowned in the McKenzie river, July 24. The body was brot here for burial. The funeral was held yesterday at the Limber parlors, Rev. Skipworth conducting the service. Interment was in the local cemetery. Undertaker Limber directing. The boy was a nephew of Geo. Doughty, of this city.

FARM BUREAU

To County Agents, Farm Presidents and Farmers:

The Mayor of Portland has organized a working force to aid in relieving the needs of the poor and the unemployed during the coming winter, when it is probable that the number in want will be unusually large.

He has appointed the Secretary of the State Farm Bureau chairman of a committee to find out what products can be secured from the farms to meet this emergency and to ascertain if a workable plan of hiring the unemployed can be devised to aid in salvaging what might otherwise be wasted.

We are calling on you for help in the solution of our problem, and should like to have answers to the following questions based on as wide a knowledge of conditions as you may be able to secure through the farm bureau leaders and discussions at Grange and Union meetings. We should like to have this information not later than the middle of August.

1—To what extent is there a loss of food products on the farm?

2—Is this loss due to the lack of sufficient help, or to other causes?

3—Are there not considerable quantities of food products, of sound quality but not of first grade, that may be purchased from the farmers FOB their stations for reasonable prices?

4—Can you give an estimate of what your county might be able to furnish in these ways?

5—Does your county ship wood to the Portland market? If so, at what price FOB cars?

6—Is there opportunity for us to get stumpage, or to cut any considerable amount on the shares?

Any suggestions that would be helpful to the committee will be greatly appreciated.

A Farm Bureau day at the State Fair has been suggested with the possibility of one or two speakers from the Agricultural Bloc of Congress. What do you think of it? Can we make it a success?

The Cotton Growers' Association now has more than 70,000 members signed up on a five year basis, which makes it the largest co-operative marketing association in the world. It will be the leading factor in the cotton market, and Texas bankers at their state convention put themselves solidly behind the movement as vital to agricultural and general prosperity in the South.

He was working in his laboratory when the explosion occurred.
