CAMPS AND MILLS TO RUN ALL WINTER

Shortage in Yards and Better Demand are Causes

STONE GETS BETTER DAILY

Many logging camps and mills in Oregon will operate the greater part of the winter, except where heavy snows will militate against cutting. The depleted yards and the increased demand are causes for promised activity.

Marshall—Two new shingle mills nearing completion.

Bend gets new \$60,000 business building.

Albany—Work starts on new \$20,000 apartment house.

Another \$100,000 private hospital started at Portland.

Newberg—300 persons employed cutting pears.

Pavement to be laid between Marshallfield and North Bend.

Medford—Carload ore Bull Moose mine brought \$1200 at the smelter.

Vernonia—500 men working on grade and laying rails on Eccles railroad.

"WE WANT COWS"

There seems to be very few cows for sale in Washington County, and dairymen should think twice before selling, as all indications point to a serious shortage. Those who have sold and are contemplating selling may find difficulty in replacing their dairy herds at any time in the near future.

Picric acid, a war salvage product, suitable for agricultural blasting purposes, is now available to farmers in lots of 100 pounds to 1000 pounds at a price of \$12.67 per hundred, according to communication sent to the County Agent. If farmers are interested in this product, which is said to compare favorably with stumping powders now in use, orders may be placed with the government for same through O. T. McWhorter at the County Agent's office. The County Agent knows nothing about this product except what is contained in the printed information available. Orders must be placed by October 5th.
