PIONEERS ENJOY GOLDEN WEDDING

Mr. and Mrs. Alonzo Sigler Entertained at Jas. Sigler Home

SQUIRE CAVE TIED KNOT

At the Isaac Butler D. L. C. in 1871

One of the happiest functions of the Autumn season was the celebration, Oct. 8, of the fiftieth anniversary of the wedding of Mr. and Mrs. Alonzo Sigler, and the occasion was rendered the more enjoyable by reason of its coming as a complete surprise to the "bridal couple." They had been invited to take dinner at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Sigler, and the first intimation that they received that an elaborate reception had been planned was when, upon entering the door, they were greeted with the strains of the wedding march and saw the assembled relatives.

The house was beautifully decorated with the brilliance of autumnal foliage and vines, while gorgeous golden dahlias and marigolds lent appropriate tones to the color scheme.

It is worthy of note that the "bridegroom" and the host are brothers, while the "bride" and hostess are sisters. Besides these four there were present the following relatives: Mrs. S. J. Hoopengartner and Mrs. C. R. Bloyd, sisters of Mrs. Sigler; her brother J. E. Butler and wife. It was regretted that the illness of her husband, Frank Barr, prevented Besie, Mr. and Mrs. Sigler's only child, from being present, but she was well represented by two of her children, Gerald and Margaret, who were accorded the seats of honor by the side of their grandparents at dinner. Nieces and nephews present were Mr. and Mrs. Dale B. Sigler, Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Brandaw, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Kellington, Mr. and Mrs. H. Ray Sigler, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Frank and Miss Gussie Sigler. With their parents were the following grand nieces and nephews: Harold James Brandaw, Dorothy Clare Sigler, Helen and Elgus Ray Frank, Allen and Marjorie Evelyn Sigler; and Mrs. Allen Parent.

Among the presents received was a splendid oil painting by James Sigler of the old homestead on the Isaac Butler donation land claim where fifty years ago Anna Elizabeth Butler was united in marriage to Alonzo Sigler, the late Riley Cave, Esq., then Justice of the Peace, officiating. A study of this painting by the guests brought back old memories, and many were the stories told of the old home, which is still standing. Mrs. Sigler related how she had gone with her new husband from the old home and set up housekeeping in a log house on the Geo. Sigler D. L. C. southeast of Hillsboro, with three-legged stools for chairs and an array of second-hand household equipment which was quite a contrast to that which is "showered" upon the bride of today. As a commentary upon the present restless age, she also told how, in fifty years of wedded happiness, they had, except for temporary absences, occupied but five homes. The log house served them for several years, after which they moved into the farm house on the Sigler homestead. Several years later they left the farm and moved to Hillsboro, occupying the Baldr residence on Baseline St. for some time, moving from there to the DeWitt Smith property on Main St., and later to their present residence, 1136 Jackson Street.

Among other presents received were four five-dollar gold pieces, a golden flower bowl with frog, a berry spoon, a serving tray and a pair of salt and pepper shakers. After inspecting the presents a splendid dinner was served, with chicken and "fixin's," the crowning feature of which was a wonderful Bride's cake, garnished with a wreath of white blossoms and alight with golden candles forming the figure 50, the work of Mrs. Frank Barr. Sharing honors with the Bride's cake was an equally good Gold cake made by Mrs. Jas. Sigler.

During the dinner the Golden Bride allowed herself a few moments of sadness when recalling her guests of fifty years ago, and realizing how many of them had passed away, but when admonished to observe what a fine flock of children, grand children, nieces and nephews had grown up to be with her today, she quickly returned to the spirit of the occasion and was the life of the party. As is customary at weddings ordinary, extraordinary and Golden the Bridegroom played the less conspicuous part, but nevertheless added his share to the gaiety of the event, and that he thoroughly enjoyed the occasion is evidenced by his remarking that this golden wedding had been such a success that he was going to try to figure

out a way to have another one. After an evening of pleasure, the guests departed with the fervent wish for Mr. and Mrs. Sigler that the golden glow of their fiftieth wedding anniversary may shed its benign rays upon their lives and warm their hearts as a beautiful sunset until death does them part—and re-unite—and that to the close of some perfect day when they shall have reached the end of their wonderful journey, the love that has gone with them, and grown and surrounded them during the past fifty years shall continue to increase and bless them abundantly. —Contributed.

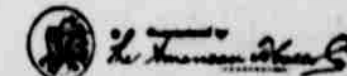

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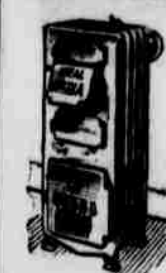
