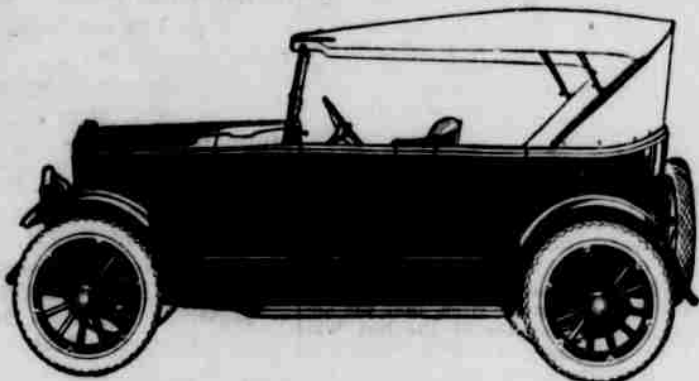

Boys' and Girls' club members of the Banks Calf Club were out 100 per cent strong with their exhibits at the Banks Hog and Dairy Show, Oct. 6-7-8. In the Club classes, Kenneth Biersdorf won first place, and the \$20 silver cup awarded by the Washington County Jersey Breeders' Assn. for the best animal exhibited by the Banks Calf Club. May Westcott, 2nd; Paul Westcott, 3rd; Edgar Westcott, 4th. In the Holstein classes, Henry Herb won first place, and the silver cup awarded club work by the Washington County Holstein Club; Leo Herb won second, and Wm. Herb, third. In the open Holstein classes, Leo Herb won third place on heifer under one year, and Henry Herb second on Senior yearling.

The Banks Club members also entered in the open classes for Jerseys competing with the breeders of the county. Edgar Westcott won second on bull one year old, while May Westcott won first and Junior Champion on a Jersey heifer calf; Margaret Biersdorf, second, and Lorena Biersdorf, third. POTATO FIELDS

Prof. Geo. R. Hyslop of the Department of Farm Crops, accompanied by the County Agent, made the second inspection of the fields of potatoes entered for certification by Washington County farmers. The following growers passed the second inspection: Maurer Bros., I. M. Wagner, J. H. Beaman, J. R. Greenwood, Thos. Williams, J. E. Lewton, Fred Krahmer and C. D. Farnham. The third and last inspection will be made after the potatoes have been dug and in storage for 30 or 40 days.

On this trip around the county, Prof. Hyslop looked principally for a disease known as Fusarium Wilt. In the growing plant this disease is first noticed by a characteristic yellowing of the lower leaves on the potato plant. Full description of this potato disease may be had by sending to the County Agent's office.—O. T. McWhorter, Co. Agent.
